**"ENTICING" THE ENEMY**

Another delightful euphemism has been added to the vocabulary of war. And as usual, it is made in Germany. It's the latest synonym for retreat. It is always embarrassing to admit retreat. All the belligerents have hedged somewhat from telling the simple, uncamouflaged truth on such occasions, but the German general staff and the German editors have shown the greatest ingenuity and versatility. Early in the war the world was made with "strategic retreats," "withdrawals to improved positions," "taking up new positions on prepared lines," etc., leading up to Marshal von Hindenburg's verbal masterpiece, "victorious retreat." But that immortal phrase has now been surpassed.

The Berlin Tageblatt, in a recent issue, seeking to prepare its readers for a possible retreat of large proportions in northern France, suggests that the German high command may adopt the brilliant plan of "enticing the enemy forward."

It may be, as one sarcastic American editor remarks, that this is what our friends the Italians have been doing. But if so, they haven't said anything about it. The expression is reminiscent of the old story told by the man who had received a victorious licking. "I threw him violently—on top of me."

**THE STUDENT OF TODAY**

"The war has brought a great change in the type of men who are attending the American colleges today," says a well known educator. "The old-fashioned college student who used to be pictured as a freak with gaudy clothes who cared for nothing but football and social affairs is no more. He has been replaced by the serious thinking student who regards it as a duty to take an interest and be among the leaders in all important public improvements."

The college president quoted makes out a good case, too. His own institution, which is a medium-sized university, has several hundred students

serving as volunteers in various branches of the military service. The upper classes are sorely depleted. And the spirit of those who remain is unquestionably more sober and earnest than formerly. The boys cut fewer capers. They pose less. They squander less time and money on frivolous diversions. They take their studies more seriously. And they engage more zealously in public affairs.

In this particular university in the past month, students sold \$300,000 worth of Liberty Bonds besides speaking for the bond issue in movie houses, participating as stumpers and precinct workers in a hot municipal campaign, working to the number of about 100 in a state prohibition campaign, doing their bit—the girl students particularly—for the ratification of a state suffrage bill, and helping with Red Cross work and various community philanthropies.

This sort of student, certainly, is not the type the public is familiar with. We have to go back to Civil War days to find anything like him

C. the favorites in the betting by from 14 to 20 points, the Aggies rushed them off their feet in the first half and came near scoring. Pullman has a strong team, but it is not up to press notices.
