IT'S UP TO US!

Now Uncle Sam has a mar-size job. The world war is on his shoulders. Lord Northcliffe admits it. It rests with us, more than any other nation, to put down German militarism, save human freedom and incidentally, make our own future safe. This last consideration should never be overlooked in discussing the present grave situation. If we had been informed authoritatively that Russia would pull out of the war, and Italy would be reduced to impotence within a few months of our entrance, we should still have been obliged to declare war on Germany.

We might have delayed a little, that is all. Germany's insolent aggressions were intolerable as matters stood. They would have become intolerably more so as her European tocs were weakened. We should have been drawn into the conflict inevitably. Now we may congratulate ourselves that we entered when we did. We are so much farther ahead. Six months more, and it might have been impossible to prevent a German peace with Europe at the Kaiser's feet and America awaiting her "punishment" at the hands of Prussia.

But all academic discussions are now over with. We are in it, and it is up to the hilt. It is time for action.

Russia seems to be going to pieces. It she can continue holding a million Germans on the eastern front, well and good. It isn't wise to count even on that. The new Bolshevik regime will try to make peace soon. What it can do is problematic. It cannot effect a general peace, because we and our allies will not consent. It may propose a separate peace and go through the form of putting it into effect, if Germany and Austria see fit to assume that this little group of "Reds" has authority to commit Russia to anything. At any rate, while continuing to help Russia and hope for the best, we'd better expect nothing and prepare for the worst.

Italy calls for a similar attitude of optimism combined with hard sense and foresight. We hope that Italy, with the help of France, Britain and America, can stem the German tide deal blow for blow and eventually "come back." There is no visible reason for counting her out of the game. But we must face the fact that she has fallen far short of our hopes, and we must prepare for any eventuality.

Suppose that Russia and Italy were both eliminated. France, Britain and America must still fight on. There is no other way. Gallic and Anglo-Saxon civilization must not be overwhelmed. The Kaiser must be put down as that other world-menece, Napoleon, was put down a century ago. Prussian militarism must be crushed as French militarism was crushed.

And we can do it. The task is not so hard now as it was then. The struggle will not last so long, nor cost so much. At least, it need not if all Americans face the facts and sternly resolve to do their duty without flinching.
