ALBANY MAN HAS A RECIPE AIMED AT H. C. of L.

Having several hundred pounds of potatoes that averaged smaller than the average English walnut, we have been experimenting, trying to discover some way to use them as food and at the same time doing it without the great amount of labor that is usually thought necessary in the preparation of these smaller ones.

At the same time we realized that we must make them palatable and harmless for the tender stomachs of children.

We believe that we have been successful.

In fact, we know we have, so far as our family is concerned, and in the interest of those who have to try, we have thought it right to tell how we cook them.

Those who care to try it will find that it costs no greater effort to prepare them than it does to prepare the larger ones.

We put what we wanted for a good meal for six into a large dishpan, and scrubbed them with a scrub brush and then placed them in a colander to drain dry.

We prepared a kettle of lard the same as for making doughnuts, and when hot poured the little potatoes in and when as brown as we like we skimmed them out with a perforated ladle, and before they were dry we salted them rather heavily.

A little care should be taken to sort them near the same size each time so that some will not get overdone while others are not cooked enough. If some are too large they can be cut in half.

The first objection that we heard in talking about this method was this, the lard bill would be large but this is not the case as the peeling of the potato keeps it from absorbing very much of the grease. They will not absorb half as much as doughnuts will.

Another thing—the grease that is left will be found as fresh and sweet as newly-rendered lard. For people having a hard time fighting the H. C. of L., this method of utilizing the small potatoes can be made to reduce their potato bill by one-half; for they can get all of the small ones they want for half what they have to pay for those of marketable size.

Anyone who likes Saratoga chips or French fried potatoes will like these.

PORTLAND GRADS TO WEAR ORDINARY CLOTHES

PORTLAND, Nov. 16.—(U. P.)—Jefferson high school girls will graduate in their ordinary school clothes and the graduation exercises in February will be minus flowers and frills. Plans adopted by the girls are carried out. Proceeds from the annual class play, instead of being devoted to the publication of a "class number" of the high school paper, will go to a war charity. The girls' wartime economy plans will net some war fund—between \$500 and \$1,000, it is estimated.

KEEP TURKEYS TILL MATURE

This year's turkey crop has been so slow in maturing that the United States Food Administration is urging farmers to withhold the birds from market until fully fleshed. The average young turkey will weigh from 10 to 15 per cent more on December 15 than on November 15th of this year. Turkeys are unlike other poultry. Chickens can be fattened at any time but a turkey does not take on much flesh until it has nearly reached maturity. Then it gains in weight rapidly.

Feed is now abundant in most of the turkey raising areas, and to place immature birds on the market means the loss of a large potential supply of turkey meat at a time when it is needed to substitute for the beef, pork and mutton that we must export to feed our army and our allies. The rapid gain in weight which turkeys make after reaching maturity will more than compensate growers for holding them the additional 30 days.
