## A JUNK DICTATOR

In an effort to eliminate "the waste  
of junk" it is reported that the gov-  
ernment is contemplating the ap-  
pointment of a "junk dictator." Such  
a functionary would be expected to  
apply to the conservation of junk the  
same methods that Mr. Hoover is  
applying to food.

The public would be subjected to  
a widespread propaganda setting forth  
the scarcity of various metals and  
other materials and the importance  
of saving odds and ends of them. The  
junk industry would be developed  
along scientific lines. Scrap piles  
would be searched systematically for  
discarded treasure. Every bit of iron,  
copper, zinc, glass, cotton, wool, lea-  
ther, etc., susceptible of being turned  
to some useful purpose would be  
saved and transformed.

Germany, it has been said, is fight-  
ing this war with what she has gath-  
ered from the scrap heap. America,  
with an enormously bigger and richer  
scrap heap, may do better than  
Germany.

"Food," we have been told, "will  
win the war." Maybe we'll soon have  
a new slogan: "Junk will win the  
war." Or, if you prefer, "Scrap will  
win the war."

## WAR BREAD AND BUTTER

An American "war bread," intended  
for use on "wheatless Wednesdays,"  
has been evolved in Pittsburgh. It  
made its appearance at a Chamber  
of Commerce luncheon given in hon-  
or of Ambassador Gerard. The  
guests are said to have accepted the  
product rather dubiously, but found  
it not so bad as it looked.

The stuff resembles Graham bread  
in appearance, but is much heavier  
and a shade darker. The loaves gain  
a certain distinction from their size  
and shape—they are a yard long. They  
contain 70 per cent of rye flour, 15  
per cent of corn meal and 15 per  
cent of alfalfa meal. It is announced  
that this bread is to be put on sale  
at the principal hotels and restaur-  
ants.

Along with it goes a "war butter"  
still more noteworthy. It is said to  
be made of chopped suet, brown sug-  
ar and green tomatoes, and allspice.  
And its color—in deference, perhaps,  
to the prevailing hue of Pittsburgh—is  
black.

The war bread might "go" with  
Americans of patriotic heart and sound  
stomach. But outside the Smoky  
City that butter will have to be cam-  
ouflaged.
