

BRITISH BREAK GERMAN LINE

Germans Driven Back Four or Five Miles in One of the War's Greatest Battles

THOUSANDS OF PRISONERS ARE TAKEN IN FIGHT

Enemy Routed in Night Attack Following Raid by Tanks and Infantry Charge

LONDON, Nov. 21.—(U. P.)—Great Haig has broken the Hindenburg line over a very wide front of at least a score of miles. The British passed through the German lines to a depth of between four and five miles. Thousands of Germans were made prisoners and a great number of guns were captured.

The British captured Welsh ridge, Centrif wood, Mesquies, Havincourt, Marcoing, Neuf Wood, Bonaires, Lateau wood and Fountain les Crossolles.
