"WATCH YOUR STEP" A STUPENDOUS PRODUCTION

Irving Berlin's international syncoated musical success, entitled "Watch Your Step," which broke all of last season's touring records for musical entertainment, will be presented at the Majestic Theatre in Corvallis Thursday night.

Everything associated with the production of "Watch Your Step" has won enviable fame in their particular field, and this musical play is described as their joint masterpiece.

Mr. Berlin, who has given the public some of the most prolific songs since the modern stage has known, formed the idea that a musical show written solely in syncoated tone would catch the popular fancy of theatregoers. He seized upon the idea with enthusiasm and not long after completed the score and lyrics. Then the book was entrusted to Harry B. Smith and none could have made a better selection. Then came the selection of men and women to stage the play. The most noted were secured. Mr. Dillingham commissioned Leon Baker to paint the production, R. H. Burnside of the New York Hippodrome to produce it and Helen Dryden, designer of all the covers for "Vogues" to design and furnish the costumes. The trio were given carte blanche. The result was sufficient to give theatregoers a distinct surprise.

It was the first time that a ragtime musical play had ever been offered for public approval. That it was a genuine success is proven by the fact that it played in New York nearly an entire season, in Chicago for three months, in Philadelphia for three months and in Boston for three months. There are 75 in the cast including the famous English Ballet and the Levinski Russian dancers. There is no question about this being the most stupendous musical organization that has ever been sent to the far West by a New York producer.

JEFFERSONVILLE AND LOUISVILLE ARE DIRTY PLACES

Lieut. F. C. Stellmacher Writes of War Preparations and Longs for West

Jeffersonville, Indiana, Nov. 15, 1917.

My dear Hornbrook: I bring you greetings from this depot, which is the greatest army supply depot in America. Here are stored supplies greater in extent even now than was used in the entire Philippine campaign. Not only one thing but practically everything that an army can use in the field.

The trip across the continent to here was accomplished without incident worth mention. A comparison of the country traveled over with that of our section makes me more than satisfied with the West and its possibilities. I left Tacoma of rather American Lake on the 2d of November for Jeffersonville, Indiana, having been ordered here to report as assistant to the depot quartermaster by a telegram from the war department. My ticket was routed over the Oregon & Washington, Oregon Short Line, Union Pacific and Chicago & Northwestern into Chicago and from there over the Pennsylvania to my destination.

This depot was built during the time when Grant was president and has stood for years occupied by a small force of men doing practically nothing until the exigencies of war suddenly made it a live and bustling place with officers and civilian employes without end. Just as in the great army camps, new buildings are being constructed for the needs of the army and millions expended in carrying out the program to put the Hun on the run and bring peace to the world. Nothing is of greater importance than supplying our fighting men in the field with equipment and material necessary in waging a war greater in extent than the mind of man ever speculated over.

Here we have acres and acres of wagons, harness of every conceivable kind, clothing factories, water wagons for sprinkling purposes, shops for automobiles, field ranges, tin buckets stacked up like cordwood, carts, ambulances, in fact so many things that it have not yet been able to see and by inspection obtain a

full knowledge of what is really taking place here.

Everything that pertains to the lines above enumerated is shipped here from contractors scattered throughout the whole nation. Here it is inspected and again sent to the armies in the field according to the needs and requirements of the service.

I have been assigned to the inspection department and have been working in the great warehouses continuously since my arrival. There are hundreds of civilian inspectors and their work has to be supervised by a commissioned officer and their findings verified before the invoices will be paid by the treasury department. Could the people see the vast stores here they would marvel at it and possibly ask what the government really intended to do with it all. It is not to be marveled at that there seems a shortage of material in this country when the needs of the army and navy are considered paramount. The deduction of so much raw material for war purposes naturally leaves a shortage for other uses and that remaining brings prices far in excess of anything ever thought possible in peace times.

There are more "Dinges" here than I have ever seen in my life. Being south of the Mason and Dixon line it must naturally follow that a great per cent of the population are of the negro race. They are a happy-go-lucky class and are everywhere in evidence doing every conceivable kind of labor. We employ hundreds of them at the depot and of course they never can be driven or coerced into doing work when it is possible to hang on the job.

Louisville and Jeffersonville are the dirtiest places I ever saw. Really said to be more so than Pittsburgh on account of the extensive use of soft coal. No one expects or even tries to be always immaculately clean.

I live in Louisville and make my connections to work by electric line. I believe that I would die of loneliness if obliged to stay in this forsaken place always.

One thing has impressed itself on my mind. That is the superiority of the West over the Middle West and South. While there may be more factories and labor more extensively employed in these sections there remains the fact that ours is a practically new and undeveloped land where opportunity spells big on account of natural resources and great areas awaiting development. To a man with red blood in his veins the Pacific slope and the West offers so much that appears in the way of sports. Hunting and fishing is unknown in these parts, except for a few rabbits and small quail—fishing is confined to bass fishing and from what I can gather the Willamette there offers everything in this line of sport that they enjoy.

The greatness of the whole Northwest stands out greater when one leaves it all and finds himself in the midst of old and worn settlements that look as old as old can be and the people asleep without civic pride or anything that makes for clean streets, painted buildings and green yards. Nothing like that around this old town of Jeffersonville. Like Rip Van Winkle that lay asleep for years and then came to—the one difference is that in these parts they have not yet awakened—nor do I know when they will.

So you see when I leave this war game after the thing has been fought out to the right kind of a finish and victory perches on our banners, I am coming back to the land where flows the Oregon and where God has piled up the earth in great mountains.
