OUR WAR PROGRESS

One of the biggest newspapers in the country—its calls itself the "World's Greatest Newspaper"—has been printing very pessimistic reports regarding our war preparations. According to its Washington dispatches there is no team work at all, no organization, nothing but waste, confusion and paralysis.

"The progress so far made in almost every line of war-time activities," says this powerful organ, "has been shamelessly slow and bungling." We turn from this exposition of American governmental and industrial incompetence to the remarkable letter written by Lord Northcliffe to Premier Lloyd-George. Northcliffe, as most Americans know, is the biggest newspaper publisher in the world. His mastery of facts, his gift of plain truth-telling and his absolute fearlessness have made him the most powerful figure in Great Britain. And we find this clear-headed, forthright Englishman, after five months of observation and collaboration with our government, telling his own government, "whose achievements most Americans have greatly admired, that we are going about the war in a more businesslike and efficient way than Britain is."

Both the United States and Canada, he says, are "proceeding with their war preparations with a fervor and enthusiasm little understood on this side of the Atlantic."

He refers sorrowfully to the "tragedies" of Russia, Serbia, Rumania and Montenegro, whose offensive power Germany has succeeded in crushing. But "there is one tragedy," he tells his fellow-Britains, "which I am sure we shall not have, and that is the tragedy of the United States." In other words, the United States will be able to take care of itself.

And he goes far beyond this in recognition of our spirit and power to wage war. Unless there is swift improvement in British methods, he warns the premier, "the United States will rightly take into its own hands the entire management of a great part of the war. It will not sacrifice its blood and treasure to the incompetent handling of the affairs of Europe."

Here are two vividly contrasting views of our war progress. The reader may choose for himself.

Navy is very much in need of 2,000 firemen, ages from 21 to 35, who will have easy hours, good pay and will have 30 days leave of absence per year with full pay. They also want apprentice seamen, machinists, mates, cooper-smiths, hospital apprentices, bakers, cooks, mess attendants, aviators and electricians. A special recruiting officer will be with Postmaster Stewart tomorrow afternoon, and will be glad to furnish information needed in relation to the navy.
