BROWNSVILLE H. S. MAY HAVE NEW GYMNASIUM

BROWNSVILLE, Nov. 22—(Special to the Democrat)—The first Parent-Teachers' association meeting of the year was held Tuesday night in the high school building auditorium. Mrs. Lillie Howe presided.

Reports were given from the state Mothers' Congress held in Eugene by Mrs. May Stevenson, Mrs. O. H. Kent and Mrs. Lillie Howe, the delegates. Prof. O. V. White, principal of the schools, gave an address of welcome. Rev. R. S. Bishop read a paper on moral training in the schools.

The question of a school gymnasium was discussed by a number of prominent business men of the city and, on motion, the president of the association was instructed to appoint a committee to canvass the town to raise money by subscription for the purpose of erecting a gymnasium on the school grounds.

She stated to the Democrat this morning that she was on her way home about 6 o'clock and that she drove down Perry street and turned into First, keeping to the right around the turn. She states that it was dark and her lights were burning.

Mrs. Holmes claims that Glen Barcher was riding along on the wrong side of the street, whistling and not holding to the handlebars and with no light on his bicycle. She came upon him suddenly just as she turned and the accident occurred in front of Sears store. Just before striking the boy Mrs. Holmes states she turned to the left and stopped her car within a car's length, near the center of the street, and about opposite the St. Francis Hotel dining room windows.

Mrs. Holmes admits that the boy was caught on the bumper of the car but claims that he was entirely responsible for the collision.
