## SHEEP FOR LAWN MOWERS

The city of Denver has ordered 3,000 sheep for delivery next spring. It is going to turn them loose in the parks and let them mow the grass, thereby saving the cost of machines and labor, keeping the lawns in better condition than could be maintained by the usual process of lamb, mutton and wool.

American municipalities are just beginning to realize that the sheep is the finest of lawn-mowers. Brooklyn and a few other cities have kept small flocks in their parks in late years, but have regarded them as ornamental rather than utilitarian. Abroad, sheep have long been used for this purpose. Flocks may be seen grazing in almost any English public park.

Our government advocates a general adoption of the practice. It estimates that several hundred thousand sheep could be maintained in our city parks, with benefit to the lawns, saving to the public and enlargement of the country's food supply.

## WRONGED ALIENS

It is natural enough, after all the American people have suffered at the hands of hostile guests, that they should finally be disposed to lump all aliens together in indiscriminate condemnation. But such a case as that of Fritz Kreisler, the Austrian violinist, shows how easy it is to make a cruel mistake.

Kreisler has been subjected lately to bitter criticism. He has been described as "an Austrian officer on furlough," giving concerts in this country in order to take American money and send it abroad to help our enemies. In a letter to the newspapers, Mr. Kreisler gives a version of his activities which shames his critics.

Kreisler admits that he has sent money to Austria. He has been described as a "small monthly allowance to his aged father." He has sent allowances to the orphan children of several Austrian artists killed in the war. Also, in fulfillment of a pledge undertaken by his wife at the deathbed of certain Russian and Serbian prisoners whom she nursed, he has sent money to their orphans in Russia and Serbia. The bulk of his earnings, he says, have gone to a brotherhood of musicians founded by him, and intended to help stranded artists regardless of nationality. For three years his con-

ditions have been the sole support of 17 British, French, Russian and Italian artists and their families, who found themselves destitute in Austria at the outbreak of the war.

He makes out a good case. And he does not say what might well be said in justice to him, that he has not been guilty of any such offensive or unwise utterances as have turned American sympathy away from some of his fellow countrymen.

Let us condemn without hesitation where condemnation is due, but let us not be too quick to assail the character and limit the feelings of a man or woman merely because he or she is an alien. There are thousands of nominal aliens in this country, whose conduct is beyond criticism. Though aliens, they are not enemies. Unjust criticism and suspicion, however, will make them enemies, when their treatment would make them friends.
