"NO ENVY"

While a considerable part of the British press and public seem to be worried by the fear that the United States will assume too much influence in the war and get too much credit out of it, the London Daily News sounds a different note.

Frankly and gladly that newspaper recognizes our strength and effectiveness. Our advent, it says, is a "bulwark of confidence" for the allies. We have changed the character of the war and placed the issues beyond doubt. And then follows this generous statement:

"If in the closing phases of the war the United States is the commanding figure, we shall have no envy and no regrets. America is a spiritual fact, the writer explains, leading to the realization of a new sort of peace, a peace which the British people greatly desire, and which is infinitely more important than any question of national prestige.

That is the sort of spirit Americans like to see. It is the spirit with which we ourselves have staked our lives and fortunes in the great war. We are concerned with the result, and are willing to let the credit take care of itself.

If the right kind of victory is won, there will be credit enough for all. And we shall be the last nation to win already by the heroic courage and claim any more glory than has been sacrifice of Belgium, France and Britain.

BRINGING SCHOOLS TO WORKERS

The Chicago Board of Education has recently undertaken a work that seems highly commendable. It has offered to supply teachers to any industrial establishment in Chicago that will spare 25 or more workers at a time from their work, in order that they may receive instruction.

It's a fine way to extend the usefulness of the public school system. It need not interfere with night school work. There are always large numbers of people eager to learn who are unable for various causes to attend the night schools.

Two large packing houses are said to have been among the first applicants for such teachers. The industrial concerns opening their doors to education during prescribed hours everyday will lose nothing and will stand to gain much in the long run by this move.

If the scheme works well in Chicago—and there seems to be no reason why it should not work—it will undoubtedly be adopted in other industrial centers in the near future. It will be a step forward in the national work of Americanization and in bringing elementary education to workers previously denied such opportunity.

LIBRARY NOTES

Amandus Butcher gives some valuable books to the library; among them is a set of Thomson's poetical works, the rare Aldine edition, dated 1830; and also the works of Montaigne, bound in sheepskin.

Mrs. A. S. Hart gives a year's subscription to The Overland Monthly, San Francisco, a valuable addition to our Oregoniana collection.

Miss Marvin, the state librarian, gives an autograph letter from ex-President Taft.

Sixty-four books were circulated on Wednesday. The growth of the library is shown by the increase in patrons. Since November 1, 45 new cardholders have been registered.

Eight different meetings have been held in the library this week.

Another appreciated gift is a rare blueprint map of Mt. Jefferson and vicinity, by E. C. Hall, supervisor of the Santiam National Forest. This is the latest map, showing all the glaciers, creeks, etc.

Mr. Hall promises to give an illustrated lecture on the Santiam Forest in the library lecture course.

The food publicity director for the state, Miss Cornelia Marvin, state librarian, requests all libraries to adopt the slogan: "No more fiction until after the war." Instead of novels, libraries should purchase books about foods and dietetics. In every way libraries should aid the government to win this war. When so many are giving their husbands and sons, should not we who stay at home be willing to sacrifice pleasure to help in every way?

Ask for the food administration pamphlets; the national security bulletins; the Official Bulletin.

"Remember those boys in France are your boys. Do your bit in saving food and they will get their bite." Ask for Mr. Hoover's address on "Why Europe Does Not Take the Corn Instead of the Wheat."
