Gilmour Dobie Called the "Connie Mack of Football"

NEW YORK, Nov. 28.—Gilmour Dobie, the man who lived in the Northwest long enough to establish a record of not losing a football game in nine years of directing teams is now the Connie Mack of the football world in these parts. Although he came out of the West—and the Far Northwest at that—sports followers in the section east of the Alleghenies have come to the conclusion that he's the real goods.

When Dobie took the naval academy team and sent into a scoring record of 307 points in four games, people forgot the fact that his team had lost a game earlier in the season. They simply remembered he had showed the East some Western football speed and were willing to admit his class.

Dobie resembles Connie Mack, both in method and the results obtained. Dressed in funeral black, tall and solemn, he stalks up and down the football field while his team is in action. He doesn't talk much, but he does a lot of thinking.

Speaking of his methods recently with Eastern critics he said:

"There are four cardinal points to making a football team, and those are the points my teams must learn before I will consent to their calling themselves football players. Those points are interference, running with the ball, blocking and tackling. Until my men have learned that point they are given no lessons in offensive play. I believe that with those things drilled into them they can get more cooperation into their work. They play more as a team and not as individuals. The rudiments must be mastered before the other points of the game can ever be considered."

The Dobie method of attack is greatly similar to the system put into effect at Pittsburg by Glenn Warner and the East has recognized for a long time that Warner knew more about football than the average impressario. It is a crushing attack, built on power and speed—and it gets results.
