Airplane Spruce Campaign
Being Mapped Out Today

PORTLAND, Dec. 5.—The intensified campaign to increase the output of airplane spruce will be mapped out here tonight. Exact specifications for rived spruce will probably be issued tomorrow.

Representative loggers and lumbermen and committees representing the Washington Employers' association and other organizations arrived here today to attend a conference with Colonel Bruce P. Dieque, of the United States Signal corps tonight. Plans to stimulate production, eliminate waste of timber, secure more men, especially highly trained woodmen and loggers, and the government specifications will be discussed.

It is known here that the government is not yet securing the quantity of high grade spruce that it desires, although production has been greatly increased. Colonel Dieque believes that with further organization and more determined efforts the Northwest can turn out all the spruce the government needs without going to Alaska, as has been planned. Alaskan spruce is not as high class as the Oregon and Washington spruce because of the low growth of limbs which makes much of the lumber knotty.
