Restaurants Asked to Help

PORTLAND, Dec. 6.—An urgent appeal is made by Federal Food Administrator W. R. Ayer to all the hotels and restaurants in the state not already observing the "wheatless and meatless" days every week, to lose no time in inaugurating this patriotic conservation measure.

"Surely no one can now plead ignorance," says Mr. Ayer. "There has been so much publicity, through so many channels, about the weekly 'meatless' and 'wheatless' day, that everyone knows all about it and its purpose. The Hoover schedule is being generally observed throughout the nation and there is no longer any excuse for lagards. Tremendous quantities of meat, wheat, fats and sugar are being saved every week by the public eating places of the country, with no hardship whatever to them or their patrons. The conservation spirit is now so enthusiastic and so universal that hotel and restaurant men have more to fear in the way of lost patronage through failing to observe the meatless and wheatless days than by keeping to their old menus on Tuesdays and Wednesdays. Let there be no exceptions anywhere in Oregon. Every public eating place should be doing its share, and swelling the splendid total that is already being reported at Washington. No matter how small or how isolated the hotel or restaurant, its cooperation is important and it should get into line with a meatless Tuesday and a wheatless Wednesday."

By way of seeing that this appeal meets with the proper response, Mr. Ayer has enlisted the aid of the small army of traveling men whose business takes them up and down the state, into every village and hamlet. These traveling men will act as special agents for the food administration, and will report conditions as they find them in the various hotels as they go along.

With several hundred of these patriotic knights of the trip carrying the conservation message into out of the way places, enthusiastically preaching the gospel of wheatless and meatless days, and reporting back to headquarters any cases of indifference or deliberate defiance of the Hoover schedule, Mr. Ayer believes the few lagards will soon be lined up.

Delinquent Tax Notices

Sheriff Bodine is today sending out notices of delinquent taxes. The law passed by the last legislature requires that 90 days after the date of payment of taxes passes, notices must be sent to each delinquent property holder. Four months from that the property will be advertised. If the taxes are not then paid the tax records may be sold.

Scio Board Resigns

The entire school board of the Scio school district resigned this week following the refusal of the voters to provide special funds for the payment of the debts of the district. The board consists of E. T. Thayer, Dr. A. G. Prill, J. P. Calavan, directors, and J. E. Wesley, clerk. A resolution, adopted by the board in resigning, states that in 1915 the voters ordered cement sidewalks and other improvements made at the Scio school. The cost of the improvements was \$1400, and interest amounts to \$224. The district neglected to provide for the payment of these bills and at the meeting on Nov. 30 they again refused to pass the levy and cut the current budget so low that it is impossible to maintain a standard school on the funds provided. In view of these facts the board decided that they could not do justice to the district and resigned in disgust.

THE PRESIDENT'S MAIL.

It Takes a Corps of Trained Clerks to Handle the Letters.

President Wilson's mail bag is the largest in the world. Thousands of letters arrive daily, and every one of any importance must have the individual attention of America's first citizen. Of course the president is not able to read all his correspondence himself. This difficulty is overcome by a carefully developed system to which the contents of the White House mail bag of any importance are laid before Mr. Wilson each day.

The work of selection falls upon a corps of confidential clerks, who open the letters and give them a first reading; then they are carefully sorted. Many of them are simply recommendations for office. These, after courteous acknowledgment, are referred to the proper departments and placed on file until the matter can be taken up for consideration.

Hundreds of the messages are purely formal or contain impossible requests. These are immediately answered by the staff and closed by one of the president's assistant secretaries.

Such correspondence as the president ought to see are clearly briefed—that is, a slip is placed at the top of each letter, and on this is a typewritten synopsis of its contents, telling who the writer is and what he has to present. Frequently the president is sufficiently interested by the brief to cause him to read the whole letter. Sometimes the communication is referred to a cabinet officer, in which case the slip is retained at the White House and filed.

Requests for charity are continually pouring in. These, however, are sent to a different department, which goes fully into each case before replying.

When a large number of persons write on the same subject the letters are bunched, and the brief at the top gives the names of those who present one argument, and on another list are given the names of the persons who offer a different view.—Boston Post.

A NORWEGIAN WORD.

Origin of "Dustboken" Which Means Spreading the News.

This peculiar word is frequently found in Scandinavian communities as the name of a newspaper, such as St. Cloud Rustboken. It is a Norwegian word, 1,200 years old at the least and has a very peculiar origin.

In those days when the coasts of Norway were ravaged by pirates the inhabitants had to resort to all sorts of devices to warn those at a distance of the approach of these piratical craft. When one was seen on the horizon a man went up to the top of a mountain, where he lit a beacon fire. This could be seen for a long distance and was known to be a warning. When it was seen in the distance another fire was lighted on another hill until all over the country fires blazed from every hilltop and the people prepared to defend themselves.

They also had a system of messengers. The man who first sighted the sail would take an arrow and send it to his neighbors. From town to town this arrow was sent until all were warned. These were rather primitive ways of telegraphing, but were so effective that in the course of twenty-four hours all Norway knew of the approach.

"NATIONAL SHOE" LATEST FRENCH WAR MEASURE

PARIS, Nov. 20.—(By Mail)—In view of the exorbitant prices asked for footwear, the Ministry of Commerce has decreed that all shops and establishments connected with the shoe trade are open to requisition and must declare their stocks. The object of this decree is to force shoemakers to give a greater value to the "National shoe" which so far has only been obtained in very limited quantities, at least in Paris. Everyone who has seen the "chaussure Nationale" declares it to be everything one could hope for. Besides being strong and well made, it has even got style. So far the only thing against it is that no one keeps it in stock.

Paying for Liberty Bonds

On November 15, which was the date on which the first installment on Liberty Loan bonds was due, approximately \$2,400,000,000 was paid in, although less than a third of that amount was due.

In other words, nearly two-thirds of the aggregate subscriptions to the Second Liberty Loan have been paid in full, the purchasers not availing themselves of the right to wait until December 15 and January 15 to make their other payments.

Growth of Federal System

Between the dates November 1 and November 16, 1917, State banks and trust companies, whose aggregate total resources are \$845,796,400, were admitted to the Federal Reserve system.

Save the Sugar

Conservation of sugar suggests to the average person the conservation of a delicacy which the majority of persons may do without and not necessitate any hardship but a more minute investigation of its food value and its uses discloses the information that the sweet is probably the greatest fuel producing foodstuff in daily diet.

Sugar is quickly absorbed by the body, creating an almost immediate energy upon its consumption. For this reason, soldiers on a forced march carrying their food with them in their pockets, are supplied with cakes of chocolate and other forms of sugar because of the concentrated energy. This illustrates one of the needs of sugar in the army and navy.

WAR SONG "OVER THERE" NETS AUTHOR \$161 A WORD

NEW YORK, Dec. 6.—Try this on your piano. When you sing "Over There, Over There" the first four words of the chorus of that war song, it represents \$644 to George M. Cohen.

Kipling, Roosevelt, and other "space writers" were distanced by Cohen with "Over There." According to Broadway, Cohen sold the song for \$25,000, or at a rate of \$161 a word.
