LIBERTY BOND PRICES

It is hard for most persons to un-
derstand the fluctuations in the price
of Liberty Bonds. Here are securi-
ties for which everybody paid 100
cents on the dollar, and regarding
which assurance has been given that
they were amply worth the price and
would always be worth it. Why, then,
ask the puzzled small purchaser, are
the bonds selling today in the open
market at less than par? Why are
the 3-1-2 per cents quoted around 99,
and more surprising still, why are the
4 per cents quoted around 98?

The difference between the two is
easily explained. There is a better
market for 3-1-2 per cent bonds than
for 4 per cent bonds, because the
former are free from taxation, while
the latter are taxable when owned by
persons or institutions with large in-
comes. This fact makes the 3-1-2
per cents especially attractive to mil-
lionaires, trust funds, family estates,
etc.

But why should any of the bonds
sell below par? Financiers say that
is simply a temporary phase, due to
the fact that bond-owners wanting
cash for speculation or other pur-
poses have been dumping their securities
on the market a little faster than the
market could absorb them. This situ-
ation, they say, cannot last, though
it may recur now and then. And af-
ter the war is over, and there are no
more big loans being floated every
two or three months, the bonds are
practically certain to go above par.
There will then be a nice profit in
selling them.

Meanwhile, no bond-owner should
doubt for a moment that his bonds
are worth every cent he paid for
them. Their interest-payments and
their ultimate redemption at par by
the United States government—the
factors that count, in estimating bond
values—are as certain as the rising
and the setting of the sun.

One of the most interesting con-
tests in Oregon's election next year
will be that for governor. The opin-
ion is general that there will be a
change.

Among those mentioned as Gov.
Withycombe's successor is Hon. M.
A. Miller, collector of internal reve-
nue, who has made good in his pres-
ent official position, as well as in
others filled by him. Mr. Miller is
considered one of the best speakers
in the state and his long public serv-

told me he went home to lunch at
noon, fully a mile away. This is such
a rare thing in the life of a big city.
I mention it.

Banta at one time had a collection
agency in Albany.
