**EMOTIONAL JURIES**

Our American jury system is supposed to be based on human reason. But it isn't. It's based on emotion. Appeals to our juries are notoriously emotional in matter and method. Lawyers play with the jurymen's feelings as musicians on an organ. The result is that jury decisions usually represent sentiment rather than judgment, in cases where human passions are involved. Often they represent mere sentimentality, carried to absurd lengths.

The Mme. De Saules case is another instance of the old, familiar story. She killed her divorced husband. There was no question about that, no denial. Theoretically, our law regards killing one's divorced husband as a capital crime rather than a misdemeanor or a playful trick. The fact that the man in question may have been a moral reprobate, and may have aroused the righteous wrath of the defendant by refusing to let her have her son according to agreement, is not regarded as justifiable ground for killing him.

If the woman knew what she was doing, she was guilty of murder. If she did not know, she was crazy. The theoretical penalty for murder is hanging. The theoretical treatment for insanity is confinement. In either case the idea is to save society from further peril.

The De Saules jury must have concluded either that the defendant had a right to kill her husband, or that she was insane when she did it. Prob-

ably both sentiments were mingled in the jurymen's minds. Anyhow, they promptly declared her "not guilty," and turned her loose.

It is a strictly logical conclusion, from such a verdict, that the jury has authorized the defendant to kill anybody else against whom she may imagine a sufficient grievance. She is made the sole and irresponsible judge of her actions.

"God bless you, child!" one of the emotional jurymen remarked, after the acquittal. "You were never in any danger." Quite true! No pretty woman who kills a man is in any danger in this country.

**UNIVERSITY GIVES \$2,893 TO FRIENDSHIP WAR FUND**  
Official Bulletin From Headquarters Reports Sums Given by Oregon Colleges

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Dec. 13.—Oregon has given \$2,893 for the student fellowship fund which exceeds the amount apportioned by \$893.

"All pledges are now due and should be paid at once," said James McPherson, general secretary of the Y. M. C. A. "If anyone has been missed in the canvass he can still pledge toward the fund if he will pay his pledge immediately. One fellow who enlisted this week came in and gave me \$10 just before he left."

The official bulletin from the Oregon headquarters reports the amounts given by the colleges of Oregon. The bulletin begins:

"Are you proud of Oregon? You ought to be. Some of the reports below are not final. Just like a big football game. You can't stop them. When you know that \$10 will save the life of a soldier in a prison camp, this winter, you don't want to stop them, either."
