Old Resident Here—

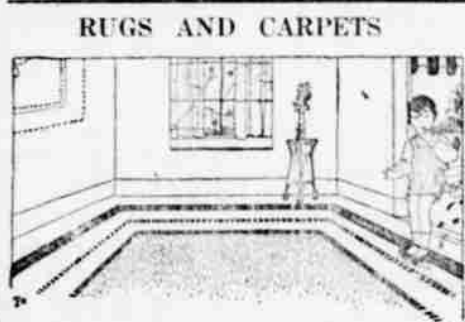

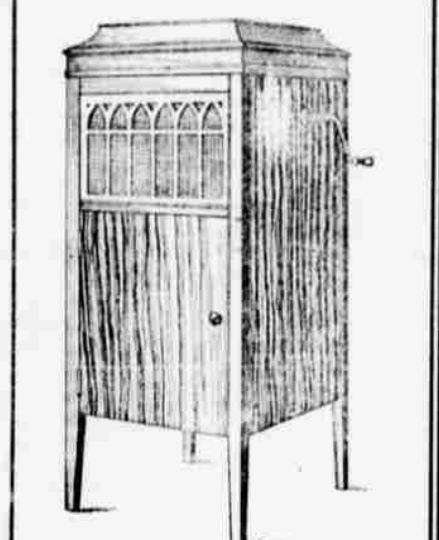
