CROP VALUES

We're apt to overestimate the value
of wheat just because we eat it our-
selves. From a broad economic stand-
point the things that animals eat are
more important. There's hay, for
example. While our national wheat
crop, at war prices, is valued at the
respectable figure of \$1,250,000,000,
our hay crop is worth \$1,250,000,000.
The cotton crop is worth more than
that, being estimated at \$1,981,000,000.
Our corn crop is the most important
of all, with its tremendous market
value of \$4,659,000,000. Our oat crop
is worth three-fourths as much as our
wheat, and our potatoes nearly half
as much.

Altogether the American farmer has
produced this year, \$21,000,000,000
worth of foodstuffs, over twice the
combined value of any two previous
years, and as much as our total ex-
penditures for the first year of the
war, including all our loans to our
allies. We rather guess Remben has
done his bit. May he do as well
next year!
