STOCKHOLM, Dec. 22.-(U. P.) A great battle in the Petrograd streets is reported. Four army corps refused the Bolsheviki orders to leave the city, and the Bolsheviki sent other troops against them.

PETROGRAD, Dec. 22.-It is reorted that Ukranians united under General Tcherbatcheff, have then over the Rumanian and southwestern front.

PETROGRAD, Dec. 22,-Ukranian roops have taken positions along the order, where their Cossacks are mobilizing. They are issuing their own toney, and a complete independent covernment has been started. The soldiers and workmens' committee ar Kieff is reported to have declared its support of Ukrania.
