MORE SHEEP NEEDED

It is being asserted that the wool
and mutton balance of the country
has been upset, like everything else,
by the war. There are said to be
1,200,000 fewer sheep in the United
States this year than in 1914. Wool
production has also steadily de-
creased. The demand has, of course, greatly
increased, as has also the demand
for mutton. It is used to be quite pos-
sible to import wool and mutton from
Australia, New Zealand and South
Africa, but the shipping shortage has
made it most unwise and wasteful to
use our bottoms for voyages of such
length as this. The immediate need,
therefore, is for the production of
more sheep at home.

There have been a few sporadic
cases of using sheep in public parks
to keep the lawns down, with the
wool growing merely incidental.
There is every reason for putting a
flock of sheep in every park in the
country next summer. The sheep
save the labor of men to mow the
lawns and clean out underbrush. The
wool can be cut from all of them
and some of them can be used for
meat at the end of the season.

There is also every reason for
farms to add sheep, even if only a
few, to their livestock for the dura-
tion of the war and a few years
afterward. More of everything which
means food and clothing is required.
The humble sheep which fills both
these needs so admirably, must not
be forgotten.

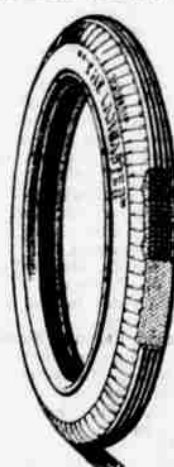
