When a young Sammy named Meadows laughingly made this remark in a dugout in the second lines the rest of the fellows laughed.

"I'll spend it for you," said one of his friends, "and think of you as I hand out each five-franc note."

Meadows finished his chow and went out through the tunnel. He shouldered a bolt of wire and disappeared toward the front lines with a wiring party.

It was pitch dark. The rest of the fellows who were in that dugout that evening recall how that Meadows' laugh wasn't altogether mirthful.

Maybe he had a premonition and was trying to kid himself out of it. Shrapnel killed him half an hour later as he was stringing the wires.

Seattle Goes Into the Fish Business

SEATTLE, Jan. 8.—The city of Seattle goes into the fish business within the next week, and will retail salmon at seven cents per pound. At present, salmon is retailing at from 22 to 30 cents a pound.

Health Commissioner McBride, deputed for the work by Mayor Gill, has selected a site for the city's stall in

a public market, and the supply of salmon will be obtained from the state fish hatcheries, which have also offered to furnish other cities in Washington, through Fish Commissioner L. H. Darwin. The fish will be shipped to Seattle after they are killed and the spawn utilized at the hatcheries.

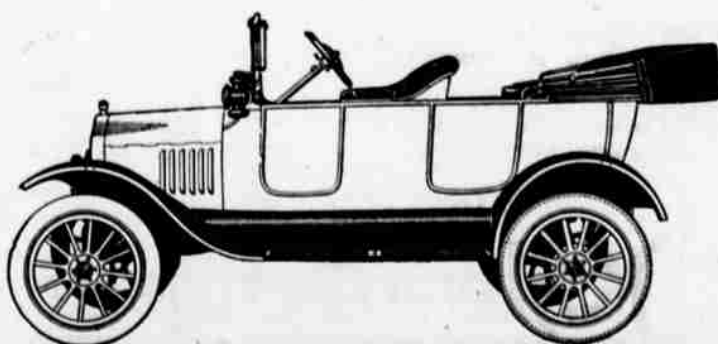
