The motor is of an improved design. The cooling is by water pump. The oil pump has been changed to the gear type. The pump is placed in the forward end of the cylinder casting. Wheels are fitted with demountable rims, one extra rim is furnished. Tire carrier is provided and is fastened at the rear of the body. The radiator is new, of an improved type, and is fitted with a connection for a smaller diameter water hose. A new oil pressure gauge has been mounted on the instrument board. New details include: foot rail; robe rail, (touring car); tilted windshield; one-man top; improved type curtains, folding up into the top; flaps on top of each door for the protection of the body and finish; pockets on the inside of each door; kick pad added at rear of front seat; front and rear fender skirts extended to meet the radiator splash guard and the rear splash guard on the body.
