C. A. "In the nature of our task it is impossible to define and limit our war work as clearly as other great organizations have done, simply because there are scores of widely varying functions and each of them vitally important in the carrying on of the war."

"But the girl, as touched by the war emergency, provides a far greater problem. It extends to almost every square mile of the zones surrounding the battlefields and to every nook and corner in our country. The employed girl, in particular, engaged in war employment in unfamiliar places, or in new occupations as resulting from the international strife, must be served from innumerable angles. It is work that the Y. W. C. A. alone is equipped to do, based upon its 50 years of experience among young women."

"We promise no spectacular accomplishment. Constructive work alone is. It goes on, not amid the rattle of guns and bursting of shells, but in the more quiet places near the battlefield, in ammunition factories, at the peaceful army camps, and even in the home. The enemy we are fighting is moral destruction."

"The future of millions of our girls hangs in the balance. The government has recognized this and asked us to take up the task of holding women's equilibrium that insidious moral decay may not attack our nation."

"With our tremendous organization, we have undertaken the work of supporting women's industrial standards, the providing of wholesome recreation, physical training, social morality instruction, safe housing, vocational training and guidance and protection for foreign-born women. I trust that the people of Albany will help us in this emergency with generous giving."

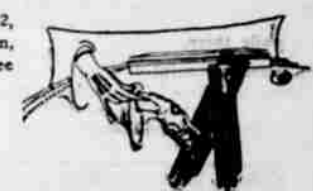

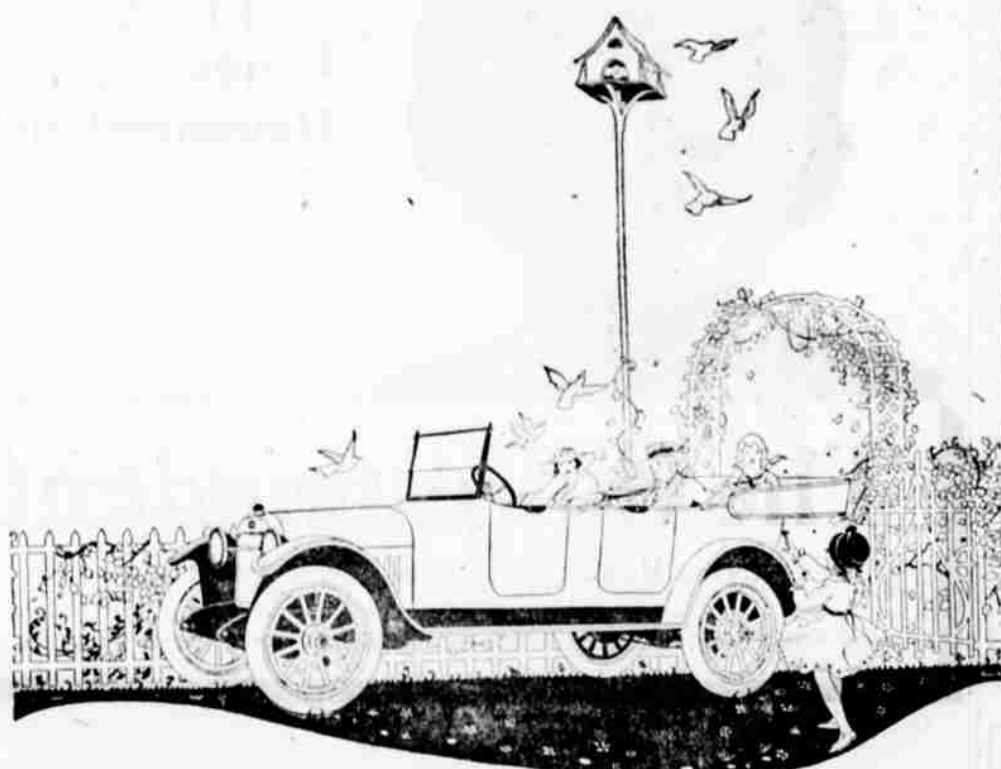

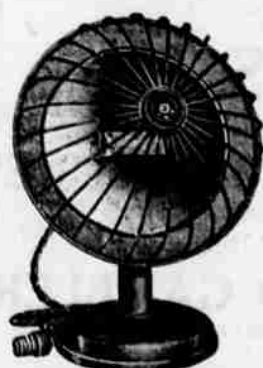
