ABILITIES OF LOCAL GAME EXPERT RECOGNIZED

That Albany has a man who is considered an authority on pheasants is shown by a recent request by State Game Warden Carl D. Shoemaker of Charles D. Alexander, for an article on the subject of the famous Oregon game bird. Mr. Alexander's article appears in the current number of the Oregon Sportsman, which is just off the press.

The Ringneck Game Ranch, of which Mr. Alexander is proprietor, is known by game commissions and breeders all over the United States and by bird fanciers in many foreign countries.

Mr. Alexander predicts the permanency of the pheasant as a game bird and advocates more extensive "artificial propagation" as a means of making the supply permanent, as well as proper protection in the fields, in his illustrated article. "Back lot" pheasant raising is advocated as a pleasant and profitable occupation, little time, energy and investment being required for a small outlay.

FREIGHT MOVING WEEK JANUARY 14TH TO 21ST

The director general of the railroads has designated the period from January 24th to 21st inclusive as freight moving week and thus relieve the freight congestion now confronting the country.

Quick unloading of cars; early delivery of outgoing L. C. L. shipments; prompt acceptance and removal of incoming L. C. L. shipments; utmost despatch in movement of traffic holdovers; extreme care on loading and billing; careful train handling to prevent damage and delays; eliminate bad order cars—we need them for loads; keep track for traffic at speed—few slow orders.

CHANGES OF SOLDIER IN ARMY SHOWN IN LETTER

The manner in which soldiers are transferred from one point to another as necessity demands is told in the following extracts from letters from Robert Pratt, of Alameda, Kansas, to his aunt, Mrs. M. W. Hodges, who lives on route four, north of this city.

The letters begin at Ft. McDowell, near San Francisco, and the last was written from Schofield Barracks, Hawaiian Islands. He is a member of the 9th Field Artillery, Battery B, at the time of writing and he expected to be transferred to the Philippine Islands.

The letters in part follow:
"I enlisted at Laverne, Okla. They sent me to Enid, Okla.; from there to Oklahoma City. Then to Dallas, Texas, then back to Oklahoma City; from there to Fort Logan, Colo., and from there, out here to Fort McDowell, Calif. The 5th of next month they are going to ship us to the Philippine Islands, or back to some point in Kansas. Hope they send me back to Kansas. Write me a nice long letter right away as it gets awful lonesome out here.

Later—I leave for the Hawaiian Islands Monday morning, Aug. 8th. Schofield Barracks, H. I., 9th Field Artillery, Battery B, Sept. 4—Received your letter; so glad to get it. Had just come in from drill and was tired and lonesome and it cheered me up.

"Think my company will start back to the states in a few months. If we do come, it will be Washington for us. Had a fine trip over here, all but two days that were pretty bad. I was sick in bed those two days, but after that felt fine. We landed in Honolulu on Monday, Aug. 13th. The Schofield Band was there to meet us. We sure had a good time that night. The next morning they took us off the boat, checked us off, and marched us down to the Oahu depot and put us on the train. It took five hours to come out to the barracks, and it is only 26 miles from Honolulu, so you see what kind of railway service we have here. The people here are very dark, the women small and not very good looking. The islands are sure very pretty. So many beautiful flowers. This is going to be a nice place to spend the winter, but I would rather be back in Kansas.

"Oct. 5—Received your letter day before yesterday, and believe me, I was sure glad to get it. Am going to tell you as near as I can what army life is like. When we left Colo. we had no idea where we were going; were just told to pack our clothing and get ready to move. I thought we were headed for Mexico, but instead of that we went to Fort McDowell, Calif. McDowell is on a little island (Angel Island) just 12 miles from Frisco. Didn't like that place at all, and was glad when we left for the Hawaiian Islands. Left Frisco the 5th of August on the transport Logan. There were over 800 men on it. We set out at noon, and three hours later, was so sick could not stand up, but after two days in bed, enjoyed the rest of the trip fine. Well last Friday we had a pleasant change. We were sent to our batteries. It was quite a change, too. We had been eating out of tin dishes and sleeping on a hardcot. Now we have china dishes and have a bed with springs and sheets on the bed. Here is our day's duties. Morning, 5:30 call. Get up. Second call, 5:45. Revolve. Third call 6. Breakfast. Fourth call 7. Drill until 10:30. Fifth call 11:30, dinner. P. M.—No calls until 4:30. Supper. Seventh call 5:30. Retreat. Eighth call 9:30. Lights out and go to sleep.

Fruit is pretty cheap here. You can get all you can eat for five cents. They raise bananas, pineapples and poi, that I know of. It rains every day. We are just beginning to have winter and it is about as warm as it is back home in the summer.

"Nov. Was turned out duty day before yesterday, and now draw \$33 a month. Bought a Liberty Bond of \$150. Will now tell you about our

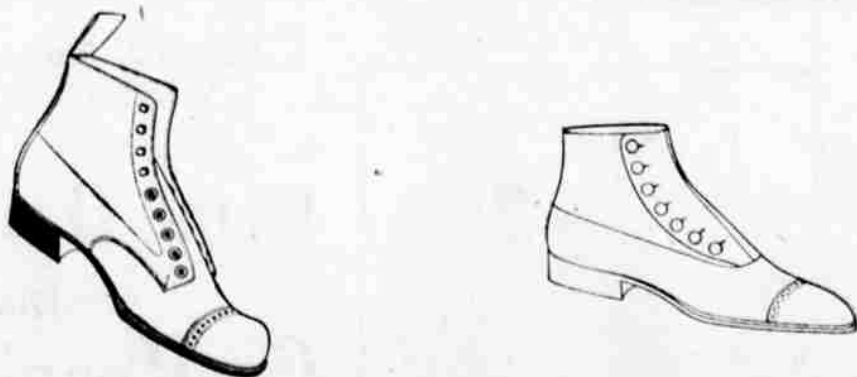
