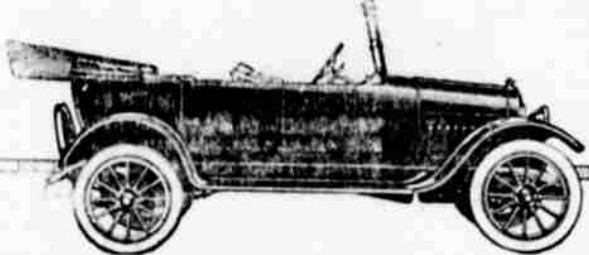

THRIFT STAMP CAMPAIGN

GAINING GOOD HEADWAY

Daily sales of Thrift stamps and War Savings stamps in Oregon are already totaling about \$12,000 daily, a circumstance most gratifying to the state director and his campaign committee, inasmuch as the campaign is just beginning to gather the momentum that will carry Oregon "over the top" again with its apportionment of \$17,000,000 of the two billion dollars to be raised by the War Savings in the United States.

State organization was given its finishing touches at conferences in Portland attended by the congressional chairman, including Louis J. Simpson of North Bend, for the first district; Leon Cohen of Pendleton for District No. 2; and F. B. MacNaughton, Portland, for district No. 3. J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of schools, and chairman of the committee on education, is working through his big organization, including county superintendents and teachers, to carry the thrift idea into the schools of the state, and other chairmen representing the social, industrial, religious, fraternal and commercial interests are getting things in running order.

Sales of thrift stamps and war savings stamps in Oregon must average \$50,000 each day of the year if Oregon is to reach its quota, and there is no doubt in the minds of those promoting the campaign but that this amount will be exceeded.

"I am going personally into every city and town in my congressional district," says Louis J. Simpson of North Bend, chairman of district No. 1 in the Oregon war savings thrift campaign organization, "and I am going to see to it that local county organization throughout is such as will assure complete success of this undertaking." Mr. Simpson has been in conference with C. N. Wonnacott, associate state director at Portland headquarters, and has entered upon his new duties with characteristic enthusiasm. "Any time district No. 2 puts it over district No. 1, it doesn't," was Mr. Simpson's parting salutation. "Just watch us."

EXCEED FOR PAST CENTURY

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18.—Appropriations by congress during the last and present sessions will approximate \$35,000,000,000 or nine billion more than the twenty-six billion appropriated by congress from George Washington's administration up to March, 1917, covering all expenses of the government including the costs of the Civil, Mexican, Spanish, American wars and the War of 1812.

In other words these two congresses will have appropriated \$9,000,000,000 more than was appropriated in the whole 128 years of the nation's history up to the time of America's entrance into the world war.
