MILITARY ORDNANCE COURSE IS STARTED

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Jan. 23.—The third class in military ordnance starts today at the University. Men who have entered the course have experienced considerable difficulty in getting to Eugene on time, as the mails have been so delayed from Washington that the local draft boards are rather backward about releasing the men from their respective districts.

This is the first class in ordnance in which the men enlist in the service of the United States before starting the course. The other two which have taken men in and enlisted them after completing the course. It is because of this change that the men are finding so much trouble in getting to Eugene on time.

Already the course is one week late, and unless the men have their releases within a few days, they will not be allowed to enter.
