PUBLIC DIPLOMACY

One of the most significant things in President Wilson's statement of American peace terms was his flat repudiation of secret diplomacy.

He praised the Russian representatives for the "spirit of modern democracy" they showed in demanding that their conferences with the German statesmen at Brest-Litovsk should be held, contrary to custom, with the doors open, with all the world for an audience.

"It will be our wish and purpose," he said, "that the processes of peace, when they are begun, shall be absolutely open, and that they shall involve and permit henceforth no secret understandings of any kind.

The peace discussions that have filled the world in the last few days are fine corroboration of the president's view. It is a remarkable fact that negotiations have actually been in progress between the allies and the Central Powers.

The nations involved are talking peace with each other. Terms are being bandied back and forth not by secret plenipotentiaries, but by the spokesmen of the people.

The newspapers everywhere are full of the matter. Men everywhere are talking about it. And in a general, broad way, what they say "goes."

The process is as yet incomplete in Germany. But the very fact that it is the people of Russia, Britain, France, etc., that are dictating peace terms tends to drive the lesson home and rouse the people of Germany to speak their will regardless of the Kaiser and his Junkers and generals.

This is something quite new in the world's history. And the realization of it gives us all a fine personal interest in the fateful decision. When we express an opinion about peace terms, when we tell a neighbor, or a friend on the street, how we think the war ought to be settled, we're actually participating in the peace negotiations.

An article in the Cologne Volkzeitung shows what the German people are up against just now. "It will be the hardest winter yet," says the writer. "Every household will feel its hardships more, because all the small stocks in storerooms and cellars have been used up."

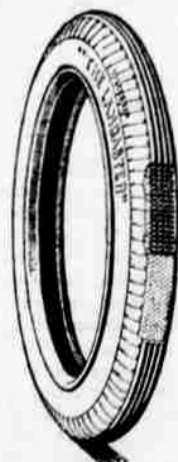
