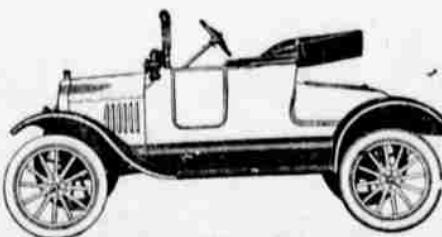

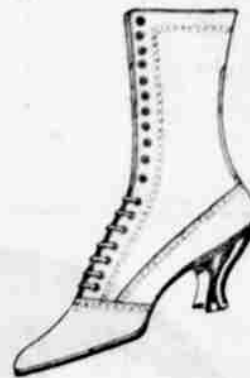

Nearly all of the men locked up during recent months have been above the draft age and boys who have not reached their majority. During the year 1917, 780 men were lodged at one time or another in the city jail.
