WAR SAVINGS STAMPS FINE EMERGENCY FUND

War Savings Stamps as a means of investment are proving more popular each day. Today Postmaster Stewart reports that a well known Linn county man brought \$824 into his office and bought the limit, \$1,000 worth of W. S. S's.

Another example is noted where another well known man, prominent granger and interested in various enterprises in the county, found out that W. S. stamps furnish an admirable emergency fund. This man had been keeping a reserve of from \$800 to \$1500 in the bank. Postmaster Stewart informed him that any time a holder of War Savings stamps wanted to get money on them he could cash them in denominations of \$100 and get three per cent interest for his money for the time the government had its use. If the money is left for the full term of five years it draws four per cent compounded quarterly.

Judge Stewart is highly pleased with the work of Miss Daisy Buckner, Seio's fair postmistress, in the manner in which she is carrying on the work in getting rid of the stamps. Not a day goes by but that she sends in her check for from \$100 to \$300 or more, and she leads the county as an individual worker.

The War Savings stamp drive, which is scheduled to start soon, has been delayed on account of the non-arrival of supplies for the campaign. This will be boosted in earnest when the goods arrive. In the meantime, hundreds of volunteers are buying the baby bonds in amounts of from 25 cents up.

COAL RECORDS BROKEN BY 1917 PRODUCTION

VICTORIA, B. C., Feb. 1.—Previous production records of the Vancouver Island collieries were shattered during 1917 when 1,698,235 long tons of coal were mined. This was an increase of nearly a quarter of a million tons over 1916. Owing to the labor troubles in other districts, the District output will not be exceptionally large.
