INSTRUCTIONS FOR ADDRESS- ING MAIL TO SOLDIERS

Mail intended for members of the expeditionary forces in Europe should bear the name and address, in full, of the sender in the upper left-hand corner, and should be addressed as follows: 1—Name of addressee. 2—Official designation of unit or organization to which addressee belongs. 3—The words "American Expeditionary Forces." Under no circumstances should the location or station of a military organization be included in the address on the mail for any member of such forces. The correct manner of addressing such mail would be as follows:

"Private John Smith,
Battery F, 146th Field Artillery,
Amer. Ex. Forces."

Mail intended for any one aboard one of our naval vessels should have upon it the name of the vessel, and be sent in care of the Postmaster at New York City.

Parcels must not weigh over seven pounds and must be securely packed and well wrapped and tied, but it is not necessary to use boxes that tin or wooden boxes should be used. Good corrugated pasteboard or, in some cases, extra strong hardware papers can be used if well tied. Articles prohibited are intoxicants, poisons, explosives, inflammable material (such as matches) and improperly packed perishable matter.

All parcels must be prepaid in full at the rate of 12 cents per pound or fraction of a pound.

Letters and parcels for the expeditionary forces cannot be insured or registered, or sent C. O. D. Import and papers which can be duplicated must be registered, but indemnity will not be paid in case of loss.

Money orders may be issued at domestic rates payable at the U. S. Mail Agency in France.

Letters mailed by anyone in a foreign country engaged in the present war will be delivered free of postage. Postage on letters and newspapers

ABRAHAM LINCOLN TO BE SEEN IN PICTURES

Opening at the Globe tonight, even ahead of the release date set for the picture, is the first of a series of ten stories on the life of Abraham Lincoln shown as "The Lincoln Cycle" and to be known in the future as "The Son of Democracy." The role of the great emancipator is played by Benjamin Chapin, and the ten stories, which are produced by Paramount, are complete in the charm of his great personality.

Manager Moore is fortunate in securing this picture so early. It takes the life of Lincoln from boyhood until his assassination, showing his Gettysburg speech, the trying times of the rebellion, his conduct of the war and even such little things as his story-telling ability and his appreciation of humor are shown. The first story tonight, as a Lincoln birthday offering, is "My Father." This shows the boyhood of Lincoln and the role of Tom Lincoln, the father, is carried by Mr. Chapin in this number. Next week will follow "My Mother."

In addition to the Lincoln picture, Louise Glann will be seen in the five-reel Triangle play, "Idolators," in which the "prince of peace" lives in the screen will be seen in many striking costumes. The play symbolizes verity, a part which Miss Glann is well fitted to carry.

RED CROSS SENDS SEVEN BOXES OF GOODS

Seven boxes of goods were sent from the Linn County Red Cross headquarters last week. These include all goods made by auxiliaries throughout the county as well as the local chapter and branches.

One box contained 3641 nine-by-nine inch gauze compresses. Four boxes of hospital supplies contained 250 towel bedshirts sent in by the Lebanon branch; 148 outing flannel pajama suits, and 102 outing flannel bedshirts.

There were also two boxes of knitted goods containing 610 pieces, as follows: 220 sweaters, 150 pairs of socks, 35 wristlets, 15 helmets and five mufflers.

The Halsey branch is commended upon the fine work being done there, a supply of knitted goods and hospital garments coming in regularly every two weeks.

A new auxiliary was formed Thursday in Hazelwood addition, and Mr. Hoover has given them the use of the store room at Ninth and Elm for the Red Cross work.

A new work that is being taken up is the manufacture of ward slips. The soles are made of quilted felt or heavy material of two thicknesses with bed ticking between. The uppers are lined with outing flannel. Donations of pieces of bed ticking, outing flannel and heavy materials are solicited.

U. SERVICE FLAG WITH 500 STARS WILL SOON BE READY

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Feb. 5.—An enormous service flag, ten by 20 feet, bearing more than 500 stars at the outset, will be made by a Portland firm for the University of Oregon, according to a decision just made by the student council. The \$85 which the flag will cost will either be paid by the University or raised by special contributions. Among the stars will be several for University women in different branches of military or Red Cross work.

Gold stars will indicate those who have died in the service. Already three are entitled to this distinction.—K. K. Kelms, Dale Melrose.
