THE GERMAN STRIKES

We have had strikes in this country
since we entered the war. Perhaps
we have had more strikes, altogether,
than Germany has had during the
same period.

There is no doubt that our labor
troubles have been used in Germany
to convince the people that our work-
ers are opposed to the war. And by
taking isolated strikes or groups of
strikes, and presenting them out of
their proper perspective, without re-
gard to the entire war situation in
the country and the general attitude
of the laboring classes, a pretty fair
showing might be made by an enemy,
quite different from the facts.

We must be on our guard, there-
fore, against attaching undue impor-
tance to the recent strikes in Ger-
many. In their actual scope and du-
ration they are not particularly im-
pressive. It will take a good deal
more than that to indicate a genuine
revolt of the German people.

However, there is significant differ-
ence between American and German
strikes that should not be overlooked.
Our strikes have been "labor troubles"
and nothing more. They have had to
do with such usual questions as wages
and hours and working conditions.
Most of them have revealed no pur-
pose more malign than a desire to
get for the workman what he consid-
ers his proper share of war profits.
They have been industrial strikes,
pure and simple.

But Germany's strikes have been
political. There was no hint, in the
recent outbreaks, of a desire for any
mere industrial benefit or reform.
The workmen were striking to show
that they wanted peace, and as a
prelude to peace they wanted their
government democratized.

This is something new in Germany.
It is a fact full of menace to the
brutal Prussian system which now
holds the German nation in its iron
grip. It is a demand that can be
postponed, but not quelled, by mili-
tary edicts and machineguns. We
shall hear from it again.

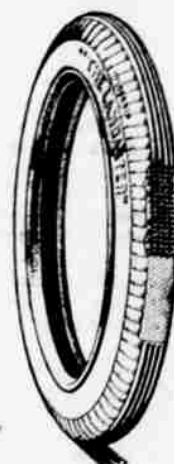
