ELECTRIC FARM IS OWNED BY TANGENT MAN

One of the most modern farms in Linn county is owned by Geo. N. Ausman, who lives on the place he bought last year from I. E. Jenks, one mile south of Tangent. All machinery on the place is operated by electricity, even the cooking being done by "juice."

Mr. Ausman has installed a 45 electric system from which he operates his feed cutting mill, pump water, produces electric lights for the house, barn and other buildings, and for other purposes. Mr. Ausman is the first farmer in the county to install an electric cooking range, which is operated from the system and saves much time in hauling fuel. He has otherwise improved his place in such manner that, with his automobile for transportation, he enjoys all the comforts of the city on the farm.

Neither Fried Chicken Nor Biscuits
Found by Hungry Hunters on
Farmer's Table.

There are all kinds and varieties of patriotism—almost as many as there are pieces of a certain variety. There is the patriotism of speech, the patriotism of arms, or money, or service and so on. But of them all the hardest for the average individual is the patriotism of the stomach. So thought a bunch of Indianapolis men who invaded Brown county for a day of hunting, says the Indianapolis News.

After a day of hiking and tramping over the hills, in which a nice string of rabbits was the prize, these "fired business men" adjourned to the farmer's house where they had planned on a big "feed." You can imagine their surprise and disgruntled feelings when on seating themselves at the table they found neither meat nor bread. The expected fried chicken and hot biscuits were missing. Of course, no one said anything, but a good many thoughts made the air quiet.

That evening as they were leaving for the train the old farmer friend pointed to a small placard in the window, and said: "Well, boys, the next time you come down we'll have that fried chicken and biscuits. Mary said we was a member of the United States food administration now, and what was the use of havin' a pledge card if you didn't keep the pledge."

They had chosen the wrong day. Besides bringing home a lesson to some of the party it served to call their attention to the fact that almost every home down there, no matter how humble and how far back in the hills, had a food administration pledge card in the window.

BANANA FLOUR AND BREAD

Green Fruit, Full Grown, Is Peeled,
Sliced and Dried, Then Ground
in Ordinary Corn Mill.

At a meeting of the Horticultural club of Trinidad, samples of banana flour and bread were exhibited and the method of preparation described. It was explained that the bananas from which the flour and bread were made had been taken from trees only five days previously, the "skin" or small variety of bananas producing the best results, reports Henry D. Baker, American consul at Trinidad.

The process was described as follows: "Full-grown green bananas should be selected. Peel, slice and dry quickly, preferably on a galvanized sheet, then grind in ordinary corn mill. From 63 pounds of green bananas 16 1/2 pounds of flour had been obtained in the specimens shown. The bread, which was very palatable, had been made from two parts of banana flour and one part of wheat flour. The banana flour could also be used as a substitute for oatmeal porridge and also for making puddings."

Army Medical Department.

There are now more than 13,000 officers engaged in the work of the medical department of the army, including regular army officers and the four of officers' reserve corps—medical, dental, veterinary and sanitary—connected with the work under Surgeon General Gorgas, says the Medical Journal. It is estimated that at least 24,000 physicians will be included in the personnel of the department when full strength is reached. Every step in caring for the physical welfare of the soldiers from the time they are sworn into service until they are discharged comes under the medical department. In this work is included inspection of foods to be served soldiers, sanitation, care of the sick and wounded, the operation of field base and convalescent hospitals, "re-education" of the permanently crippled, handling the supplies for all this work, etc. The total number of hospital beds will be on a basis of 25 per cent of the strength of the army.

Don't Flatter Yourself.

"Somehow I was always different from other people," is a common saying among men, even among those who lay no claim to any special virtue, observes Los Angeles Times. Indeed, the statement is often made by those who pretend to be ashamed of their vices, but who are really almost proud of them. You belong to the race and probably are neither better nor worse than any one of the vast majority. Everybody thinks that he is different from all the rest. He isn't!

To Save Tin Now Wasted.

A small electric furnace has been installed and operation begun on the volatilization of tin from scrap at the Northwest experiment station of the United States bureau of mines at Seattle, Wash., says the Engineering and Mining Journal. An extensive series of experiments will be carried out there with the idea of saving the tin now wasted in discarded containers and other forms of scraps.

MUSIC FOR THE WAR TANK

Graphophone Records Are Gift of
Woman; French Officer Requests
Bowling Equipment for His Men.

For the amusement of soldiers probably no more unique donation has been made than that of \$50 from a woman for graphophone records to equip a tank. There is something grotesque about music emanating from this weird iron caterpillar, states a trench correspondent.

Other donations have not lacked an element of the picturesque, as, for instance, the supplying of a hospital in Paris which was filled with African troops, with 700 fans. They were so appreciated during the summer that the hospital appealed for more. An accordion was sent to fill a specific demand.

One French officer requested games for his men. What sort? In one regiment in which most of the soldiers were fathers of families the preference, for some reason or other, was for bowling. The trench, it must seem, does not make a bad ally if a few balls and pins will live a dull period. Possibly a change of noise is agreeable.

Kitchen Soldiers.

Kitchen soldiers are the latest experiment in practical patriotism. Good Housekeeping, in cooperation with the United States food administration, is conducting the enlistment. In the magazine appears this pledge, which women are urged to sign:

"I, the member of the household entrusted with the handling of food, do hereby enlist as a kitchen soldier for home service and pledge myself to waste no food and to use wisely all food purchased for this household, knowing that by so doing I can help conserve the foods that must be shipped to our soldiers and our allies."

This is a movement for the woman who is actually dealing in the food of American homes. Employers and employees are urged to join the forces. A soldier may be one who fights just with her brain or one who fights by doing with her hands the work of women in this crisis. She may be one whose ancestors have lived here for generations or she may be one whose parents have seen war's horrors pass their very door abroad, whose brothers bear the arms of England, or France, or Italy, or Russia, or any other allied country. Once you have enlisted as a kitchen soldier, your kitchen is your battlefield.

Overcoming Camouflage.

An American physicist believes that the advantages of camouflage—or at least certain kinds of camouflage—can be overcome by an opposing army by providing colored glasses or screens of contrasting colors to use with field glasses. When the colors of these screens are properly selected, uniforms and other objects may be made to appear in contrast, instead of in harmony with their surroundings, he claims. Camouflage as practiced in many cases is accomplished largely by the use of paint, objects being given shades that blend with the landscape. In spite of certain difficulties that would arise, it is believed that such efforts at concealment could be rendered quite ineffectual by the means stated.

TIME ON WAR RISK INSURANCE IS EXTENDED

That the time for filing applications for soldiers' war risk insurance which was to have closed on Feb. 12 for those enlisting before October 1, has been extended by the war department was made known today by the receipt of a telegram from Geo. F. Porter, chief of state councils section of the Council of National Defense.

Although 95 per cent of the men in cantonments are insured, there are still many volunteers who have not taken advantage of the offer of the government to insure their lives and limbs at the nominal sum charged. It is the duty of families of the boys in the army and navy to urge them to take out insurance, not only for the protection of their dependents in case they lose their lives, but for their own protection should they become disabled. The telegram, which was sent to Bruce Dennis at Portland, follows:

"The time for filing applications for war risk insurance has just been extended by congress to April 12th. Automatic insurance, however, has

ceased entirely and no man is now insured by the government unless he has applied. This makes voluntary application doubly important. Have your publicity man spread news through state and continue campaign to bring family influence to bear on men not yet insured."
