GEORGE WASHINGTON

George Washington was born Feb.
22, 1732. One hundred years after
that birthday, on February 22, 1832,
Daniel Webster delivered at a pub-
lic dinner in the city of Washington
a speech on the Character of Wash-
ington which has since become fam-
ous. In it he says:

"A true friend of his country loves
her friends and benefactors. The
voluntary outpouring of the public
feeling, made today, from the north
to the south, and from the east to
the west, proves this sentiment to be
both just and natural. In the cities
and in the villages, in the public
temples and in the family circles,
among all ages and sexes, gladdened
voices bespeak grateful hearts and a
freshened recollection of the virtues
of the Father of his Country. And
it will be so, in all time to come, so
long as public virtue is itself an ob-
ject of regard."

The history of the past 86 years
has justified these words. The fol-
lowing passage is not only true. It
is strangely prophetic:

"Gentlemen, the spirit of human
liberty and of free government, nur-
tured and grown into strength and
beauty in America, has stretched its
course into the midst of the nations.
Like an emanation from Heaven, it
has gone forth and it will not re-
turn void. It must change, it is fast
changing, the face of the earth. Our
great, our high duty is to show, in
our own example, that this spirit is
a spirit of health as well as a spirit
of power; that its benignity is as
great as its strength; that its effi-
cacy to secure individual rights, so-
cial relations and moral order, is
equal to the irresistible force with
which it prostrates principalities and
powers."

"There is no danger of our over-
rating or overstating the important
part which we are now acting in hu-
man affairs. It should not flatter our
personal self-respect, but it should
reanimate our patriotic virtues, and
inspire us with a deeper and more
solemn sense both of our privileges
and our duties. We cannot wish bet-
ter for our country, nor for the world,
than that the same spirit which in-
fluenced Washington may influence
all who succeed him; and that the
same blessing from above, which at-
tended his affairs, may also attend
theirs."

IN SRITZ'S DOMAIN

New Year's Eve, or St. Sylvester's
night, is celebrated in many German
cities, especially in Berlin, by a cu-
rious bit of horseplay. Everybody
is privileged to bonnet with a blow
of the fist any citizen who ventures
into the street after dark with a
high silk hat. The unfortunate victim,
or from the provinces, the stranger
ignorant of the peculiar customs of
the day, strolls blithely down the
street, clad in the garments usual to
elegant civilization, and enraged by
reason of his being attacked, rushes
to the shelter of the policeman near-
by. When the assaulted wretch has
told his tale, with a gesture im-
itating the mangled remains of his
hat, the guardian of the peace offers
him as an only consolation: "Do
not wear a silk hat in the street on
Saint Sylvester's Day."

An interesting story is told of how,
in his boyhood and in his early mon-
archical manhood, Emperor William
II used to sally out incognito on
New Year's Eve to take part in this
popular diversion, but he has aban-
doned it since he encountered an old
gentleman who, with a view of get-
ting even with the young man who
had destroyed his top hats in pre-
vious years, had equipped himself with
nails, points upward. The conse-
quence was that when the imperial
first came down with crashing force
on the inviting-looking hat it encoun-
tered the nails, which lacerated big
Willie's hand in so serious a manner
as to necessitate the attendance of a
surgeon.

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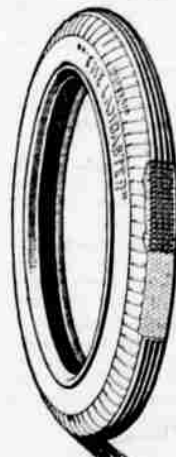
