RIFLE PRODUCTION

There was one item of news car-
ried in the press reports Saturday
which will not be made the subject
of editorial comment in the republic-
an press. In fact, the item needs
no comment, and we therefore print
the same below as a striking illus-
tration of efficiency of the American
government:

"Rifle and cartridge production
reached a plane guaranteeing plenty
of fighting materials for the Amer-
ican army in France.

"Since April 6 this country has
turned out 700,000 rifles. For the
week ending February 9, 15,102
rifles were the daily output, with
71,192 for the week. This was four
times as many in one week as
Great Britain turned out in ten
months of war.

"Also, at the end of ten months
of war, the United States has pro-
duced twice as many rifles as Great
Britain did after two and a half
years of war.

"Production has been hampered
by the difficulty of procuring steel
and skilled labor. The rifles
being made are a combination of
the Enfield and Springfield. Some
\$400,000,000 has been spent to pro-
duce these rifles.

"The production of cartridges
during January was 7,300,000 a
day."

The Bolsheviks stopped fighting be-
cause they are "unwilling to kill their
fellow workmen and peasants of Ger-
many and Austria." But we notice
that the workmen and peasants of
Germany and Austria are still will-
ing enough to kill their brethren in
Russia and other neighboring coun-
tries.

The official German press finds
President Wilson's peace terms "as
vague as ever. The German press
would find the Ten Commandments
vague and absurd if they were quoted
verbatim by any allied statesman.

A VOICE FROM THE FRONT

A letter from a regular army of-
ficer in France, written on Jan. 5
and printed in the Army and Navy
Journal, gives this refreshing view
of our war progress:

"The United States is certainly do-
ing more things over here in getting
ready to deal the Kaiser and his
dastardly hordes a clean knockout
blow than most Americans at home
have any idea of. I wish I was at
liberty to state what wonderful progress
in the midst of heart-breaking
obstacles has already been accom-
plished.

"I can only state in a general way
that our engineers have done great
things in the way of railroads, wagon
roads, etc. Our lines of communica-
tion are already immensely advanced.
The artillerymen, both light and
heavy, are on the job preparing prop-
er doses for the Boche, and you can
bet he won't like the taste of them.
We have a large number of heavy
calibre guns from the United States,
which the railroad artillery is to use,
but the light pieces we use at present
are the French 75mm., which our
men cannot praise too highly.

"Our infantrymen, signalmen, avia-
tion section, medical men, etc., are
equally alive, and so are our Q.M.
corps, ordnance department and other
elements. It would most assuredly
make interesting reading if I could
go into details, but the rules forbid."

And so it goes—the same old story,
familiar to the British but new to us.
The doubt, discouragement, division
and hickering are found only at home.
The nearer you get to the front, the
more cheerful is the atmosphere, the
more inspiring the morale, the more
obvious the results attained.

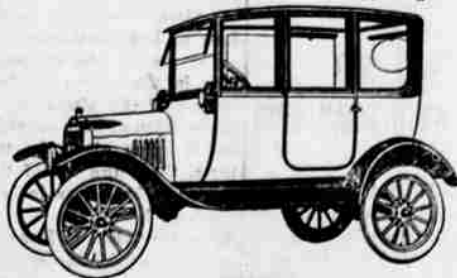

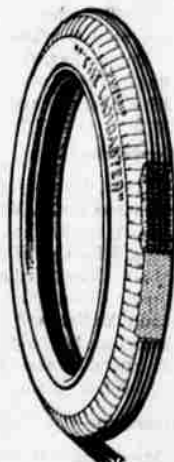
