"THE LONE WOLF" SELZNICK FEATURE AT ROLFE TONIGHT

"The Lone Wolf," Herbert Brenon's picturization of Louis Joseph Vance's thrilling novel of mystery and adventure, will be the picture attraction on the program of the Rolfe theatre Friday and Saturday.

In his previous Selznick-Pictures, "War Brides" and "The Eternal Sin," Mr. Brenon dealt with themes of deepest tragedy; but in "The Lone Wolf" he has a story of entirely different character to depict. It relates the adventures of a master cracksmen known to the police as the Lone Wolf. This man became a crook through his adoption in his boyhood by a clever criminal, who was killed through the treachery of one of his accomplices. Against this accomplice named Eckstrom, the boy swears vengeance and when, in later years, he comes across the trail of this man, he pursues it with an inflexible purpose. The trail leads him into a series of highly exciting adventures with a gang of crooks known as the Pack.

In the course of these adventures he meets a wonderful girl who, he believes, is herself a crook, but who is in reality a secret service agent. The Lone Wolf saves her from the Pack and they escape from France to England in an aeroplane, after several stormy scenes in which they pass through many thrilling perils. In the end the girl discloses her identity but lets the Wolf escape under the promise of reformation, and it is left to the spectators to imagine a subsequent reunion of the couple, under happier and more tender circumstances.

Hazel Dawn, who is known to every devotee of stage and screen, and Bert Lytell, an actor of international reputation, play the leading roles, and in their support appear such distinguished names as Alfred Hickman, Edward Abeles, William E. SAMUEL W. DUGGER PASSES

Samuel Wesley Dugger, a sergeant member of the Seventh U. S. Cavalry band, died at El Paso, Texas, on Saturday, February 23, because of a second operation for gallstones. Sam, as everybody about Scio knew him, was born on the home farm, near Tallman, September 9, 1874. Here he grew to adulthood, coming to Scio with his parents in 1890. His education was obtained in the public schools and in the printing office.

Being a devotee to music, he enlisted in the Fourteenth U. S. Infantry in 1906 as a member of the band, going with his regiment shortly thereafter to the Philippine Islands. In 1908, returning to the United States, his regiment was stationed at Helena, Montana, until the close of his enlistment.

In 1909 he enlisted in the naval station training band and was located at Goat Island, San Francisco, during this entire enlistment.

In 1913 he enlisted in the Seventh Cavalry band, of which he was a member at the time of his death, at the age of 43 years, 4 months and 14 days.

For the past year or more, or since the occupation of Mexican territory by General Pershing, the Seventh Cavalry has been doing border duty, being stationed at El Paso, Texas.

Sam will be remembered by his Scio friends as an athlete, baseball player, etc., and his death is a surprise to them.

A telegram was received Tuesday from the quartermaster of the regiment stating the body, with escort, would leave El Paso at 5 p. m. February 26, and was due to arrive at Albany and West Scio on Saturday evening, March 2.

The funeral has been arranged for Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Mr. Willard Marks of Albany will deliver the funeral oration at the grave, in Franklin Butte cemetery, at the conclusion of which "taps" will be sounded, announcing the completion of the burial of Scio's first victim of the war with Germany.—Scio Tribune.

Saccharine.
As none of it is absorbed by the blood, diabetes is allowed to use saccharine instead of sugar. But saccharine has been accused of causing grave troubles to the digestion and it has even been indicted as a cause of cancer. The best medical opinion, however, acquits it of these charges, for there are many diabetics who have used it regularly for many years without any ill effects. In France saccharine may not be given to infants, the aged and the sick without a doctor's prescription.

Much Nutrition in Barley.
Although barley has been used chiefly for brewing and malting, it is known to be highly nutritious. Its food value ranks practically the same as that of wheat. The pearl barleys in soups and in cereal form are widely used, but the barley meal should be better known. It can be readily ground at home in hand mills. And, anywhere that whole wheat flour or cornmeal can be used, with one exception, barley meal will be found a perfectly satisfactory substitute.
