### WHEAT-CORN YEAST BREAD.



Wheat-corn bread is more nutritious than bread baked with wheat flour alone. Thousands of American families today are using this mixed flour bread, and in so doing are enabling America to provide more wheat flour for the allies. Here's a tested recipe for this bread: Take one and a half cups of milk, water or a mixture of the two; one-half cake compressed yeast, one and a half teaspoons salt, one tablespoon sugar, one tablespoon of fat if desired, one cup cornmeal and two cups wheat flour. Put one and a half cups of water, the cornmeal, salt, sugar and fat (if used) into a double boiler and cook twenty minutes. The water is sufficient only to soften the meal a little. Allow the meal to cool to about the temperature of the room and add the flour and yeast mixed with the rest of the water. Knead thoroughly, make into loaf, place in pan of stand and size, allow to rise 45 or 50 minutes, fill the pan and bake 45 or 50 minutes. It is hardly practicable to use a greater percentage of cornmeal than this even in emergency, for bread so made often varies from baked much. Less cornmeal can be used and in such a case the general method given above may be followed. It is possible to make a yeast raised corn bread without first cooking the cornmeal. In this case not more than one cupful of meal should be used to four cupfuls of flour. In other words, the meal is mixed and baked as in the above recipe.

### Meatless Mince Pie.

Meatless mince must, another culinary triumph in the art of food conservation, has been brought to the homes of the country by the national emergency garden commission as a worthy companion of pumpkin-less pumpkin pie and gingerless gingerbread.

The new mince meat, officially described as a "camouflage," was tried on five hundred troops on a transport, who pronounced it perfect and called for more.

Half a package of seeded raisins, half a pound of prunes stewed with lemon juice and peel, one-quarter cupful sweet cider, four tablespoonfuls brown sugar; chop the raisins and prunes together and the result is said to be a meatless mince pie which will accord with the food administration's meatless Tuesday.

Sleeper Tax Hits Porters. However patriotic may be the motive of the traveling salesman and the general public who ride in sleeping cars, the negro porters assert they are bearing an unequal part of the new war tax, says the Kansas City Star.

Where the porter formerly received a tip of 25 cents for shining the shoes and brushing off his passenger, the negro says the tip now is only a dime. "My tips have been reduced one-half," one porter said. The government since the first of November has added 10 per cent to the sleeper fare as a war tax. As it now stands it is the porter and not the passenger who is paying the tax.

Icelanders Are Intellectual. During the decade which has been virtually continuous since 1874, the people of Iceland have acquired a stock of political opinion, which, supported by high intellectual ability and literary, fully qualifies them for a conflict with Denmark, says a writer in Iceland is among the first countries of the world in literacy. Few in the island can neither read nor write, and one author has declared that every citizen from the street is a poet. Literature is not confined to any particular class—one of the most vivid descriptions of the land ever written is the work of a guide, while many fishermen write poetry of merit.

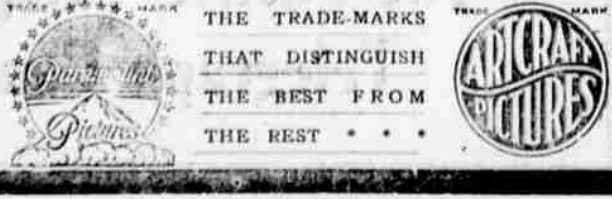
