MONEY WILL REACH ARMENIAN SUFFERERS

The executive committee in charge of the coming drive in Linn county for the relief of Armenian sufferers issued a statement today showing that all of the money raised for this purpose will reach its destination and be used in actual relief work. This statement is in response to doubts which have been expressed by some local people that the money may never reach the Armenians, but be confiscated by Turkish officials. The committee's statement is as follows:

The problem of transmitting funds to these workers has been solved in an entirely satisfactory manner. A representative of the Armenian Relief committee, formerly in Constantinople, is now in Switzerland in charge of these arrangements. (With the approval of the U. S. state department relief remittances are made to his credit in a Swiss bank. This credit is drawn upon by a commission of American missionaries who are now attached to the Swedish legation in Constantinople for this purpose. They sell drafts on the Swiss bank, thus securing cash in Constantinople, which then either remits to the missionaries and other workers through local banks, or holds subject to the order of those agents in cases where they can sell drafts locally to better advantage. While these remittances are made with the knowledge and approval of the Turkish government, the money never passes through Turkish hands.

In order to insure that relief sent actually reaches and benefits those for whom it is intended, for the purchase of supplies which are given out directly to those in need. This is often done on the advice of local

REPORT IS MADE ON ENGINE'S DERAILMENT

The official report of the board of inquiry covering the derailing of engine No. 2335 of train No. 14 one mile north of Millersburg on March 12, has been made public by F. L. Burkhalter, superintendent of the D. & W. Co.

The board of inquiry was composed of F. L. Burkhalter, supt.; H. M. Lull, division engineer; D. M. McLoughlin, asst. master mechanic; A. W. Bowersox, of Albany, and S. Senders, of Albany.

As a result of the accident 15 demerits were marked against the record foreman, but leniency was shown on account of his long and faithful service as a foreman.

The accident occurred while the train, containing the engine and ten baggage and passenger cars, was running 40 miles per hour. The derailing of the lead wheels of the rear truck of the tender was caused by the irregular surface in the track resulting from settlement in an adobe cut. The tender wheels climbed the rail and ran 28 feet on top of the rail and 1420 feet on the ties.

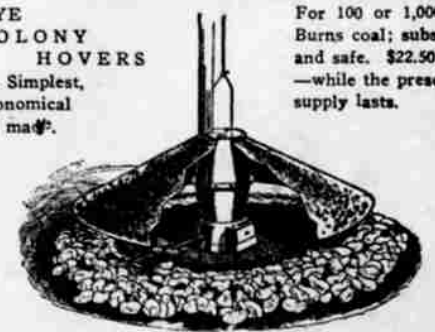
