WHY TEACHERS ARE SCARCE.

It's no wonder there is an alarming
famine in school teachers, considering
the low salaries paid to teachers and
the more attractive opportunities offered
in the business world.

Twenty years ago there was nothing
else for the young women to do.
Teaching was her only chance to earn
money. Young men went into it then,
as now, simply as a means to earn a
living while getting ready for some-
thing else. Salaries were low because
they could be low and still attract
good material.

This is no longer true. The open-
ings for both men and women have
multiplied. Why should a young wo-
man just out of college go out to the
discomforts of the average country
school and earn ten dollars a week or
thereabouts when she can get a job in
an office—a job which ends every
evening and begins afresh every morn-
ing without the continued, sleep-
wrecking responsibility of getting
children through grades—and earning
more money right at the start?

If we want competent teachers to
bring up our children we have got to
reform the whole system by which we
train them and work them and pay
them. We've got to stop preaching
about the sacred beauty of a teacher's
life on nothing a year, and pay the
hardest, most responsible, most im-
portant work of bringing up our child-
ren exactly what it is worth.

When we pay a school principal
about twice as much as a buyer in a
department store, and require real
brains and executive ability, and then
give her a chance to use them freely,
we shall get the right man or woman
for the job, and as many as we need.

GUARD THE FLOUR.

"I want to make a plea that the war
bread should be real bread, whole-
some and nutritious," says Harvey
Wiley in a recent article.

"I want to make another plea,
namely, that the baker or the house-
wife should be the only person per-
mitted to mix foreign substances with
wheat flour or wheat meal. If left to
the millers it opens the door wide to
adulteration. It is easy enough
to prescribe the proportions of defi-
nite materials which may enter into
wheat bread, but it would be almost
impossible to supervise the mixing of
such substances at the mills. The
housewife can be safely left to do the
right thing by her own people. She
can be told what are the best sub-
stances to be used and in what pro-
portions they should be mixed in her
own home.

"As far as the baker is concerned,
he is easily supervised by the local
authorities, and they can see that he
does the mixing in the way prescribed."

Dr. Wiley approves of grinding
flour at the bakery. "If the bakers
could be provided with the raw ma-
terials and the mill, they could grind
their flour as they need it, and the
whole question of storage and spoil-
age of flour would be solved."

The vital and significant point is
that the milling of flour must be
watched now more closely than ever.
There has always been a temptation
to adulterate flour at the mill, and
the avoidance of this by the strict en-
forcement of strict legislation is only
beginning, after years of crusading,
to have its effect. Raising food stand-
ards in any way, closing the doors
against adulteration and poisoning,
has been so long, so hard, so painful a
process, that it is no wonder the ear-
nest workers in that field dread the
possibility of having them opened by the war.

It is the same with food as it has
been with hours of labor, women's
work, child labor and all the products
of social reform. Letting down the
bars because war is given as an ex-
cuse means that the work must all be
done over again.

England learned by sad experience
that letting down the labor bars did
not pay. Let us learn that about food
right now. If ever we needed food
that was honest, food that was really
nutritious, we need it this year. Prof-
iteers and poisoners are few and can
not prey upon people who are on guard.

Bread is the staff of life. It must be
guarded by the many honest folks
against the evil plotting of a few.

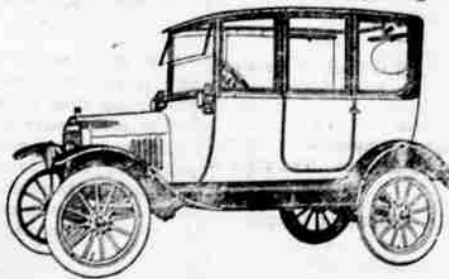

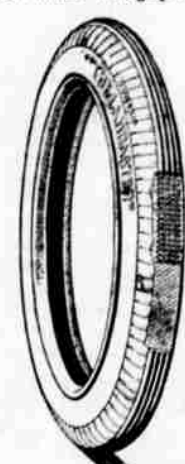
