MATRIMONIAL—MURDERS

There is a case that has been at-
tracting considerable attention in the
Middle West, of a man whose wife
was unfaithful to him, who came home
from a journey, found the guilty pair
together in his home and shot the
man. It is a sordid and unpleasant
mess, hardly worth mentioning except
for one point.

The husband has been given a great
deal of sympathy for his wife's "in-
gratitude." It seems that he lavished
on her money, jewels, luxuries of all
kinds and even personal service. Much
stress is laid on the fact that at one
time the wife was having a good time
in Atlantic City while the husband
was preparing a home for her. He
chose the carpets, curtains and every-
thing else, and got it ready in every
detail before he sent for her. She
walked into the home ready-made.

And by so doing he laid the founda-
tions for his future unhappiness. It
is just like the typical case of an un-
grateful son, whose mother did every-
thing for him, turning on her in her
old age, disregarding her comfort
perhaps abusing her.

The wife in this case exactly ex-
emplifies the old proverb. Satan found
mischief for her idle hands.

She went wrong because she had
no work, and no responsibility. No
person, man, woman or child, can keep
straight without those two things. Ac-
tivity is essential for the human race.
Either there will be constructive ac-
tivity or destructiveness.

This wife was only a child when
she married. And her husband made
a doll of her instead of a partner.
Had she been obliged to do the work
of getting a home ready—and all wo-
men who have ever done it know this
is no child's play—she would be
appreciated the home when it was fin-
ished. Had she been obliged at every
step to take the responsibility of par-
nership in the business of home and
family, she would have felt a sense
of duty toward them. She would
have taken interest in them. No
woman who has had time to get into
trouble.

If love means anything, if a home
means anything, if a family means
anything, if a nation means anything—
there must be fair sharing of re-
sponsibility. Without that fundamen-
tal essential, there will eventually be
no love, no joy, no freedom left to
share.

ARMY HEALTH GOOD

The nation has been congratulating
itself on the virtual elimination from
our army of the old-time camp dis-
eases such as typhoid, dysentery, cholera
and smallpox. Never in the history
of armies have any been so free from
these plagues as in the present war;
and nowhere is the situation better
than among our own troops, at home
and abroad. The credit for this fine
showing is given chiefly to the thor-
ough system of vaccination or inocu-
lation employed by the army medical
department.

And now comes a woman critic
bearing the title of recording secre-
tary of the National Anti-Vivisection
Society, alleging that this inoculation
is wicked and murderous, that through
it the health of our new armies
is being wrecked and great num-
bers of men are being killed.

All this, of course, is the veriest
rot. But it cannot be dismissed with
a gesture of contempt. Those who
disseminate such nonsense may ac-
tually believe it. But sincerity is no
excuse. Their ignorance becomes
wicked and criminal when it is delib-
erately spread before the general pub-
lic in the guise of truth and used to
discredit the invaluable work done by
the army medical service.

It may work harm to the health and
morale of the army by influencing li-
berant soldiers. At the very least, it
brings doubt and worry to the hearts
of thousands of relatives at home. It
should not be tolerated, any more
than we tolerate any other propaga-
nda tending to undermine our military
efficiency.

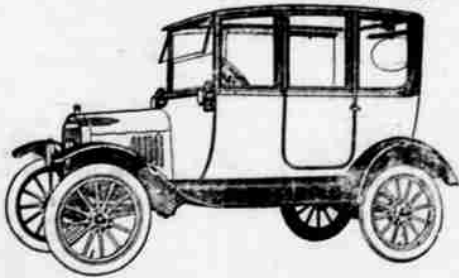

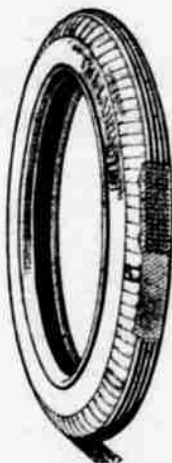
