STANDARDIZING THE RAILROADS

For years we have been talking of industrial efficiency. Now that term is too vague and general. We are boiling down efficiency down to "standardization." It's the last word in economic progress.

The process has already been applied to our army trucks, our fabricated ships, our airplanes and other important parts of our war equipment. Now the government is planning to apply it to the railroads.

The railroad administration expects to spend from \$500,000,000 to \$1,000,000,000 for new equipment this year and, as a preliminary, is working out plans for a thorough standardization of locomotives, boxcars, flatcars and other forms of rolling stock. Not only will types of cars and engines be standardized, but their parts will be made interchangeable, thus greatly facilitating assembly and repairs.

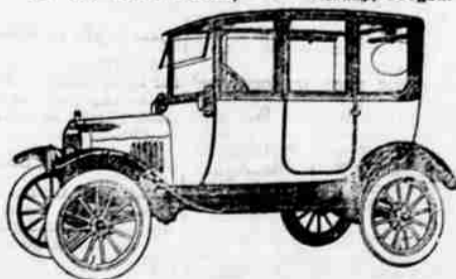

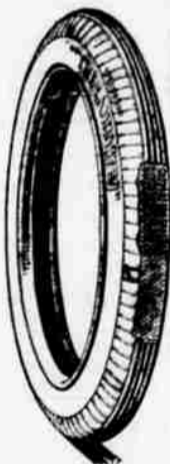
