THE CASUALTY LISTS

There should be no alarm felt by
anyone over the prospect that the war
department will stop issuing for pub-
lication full daily casualty lists with
the names and addresses of the men.
It is expected that at least the ad-
dresses will be omitted in the public
lists, and it is possible that the gov-
ernment will adopt the European sys-
tem of issuing the lists once a week
or once in two weeks instead of every
day.

The purpose is protection for the
army. It is explained that the pub-
lication of full and prompt data re-
garding casualties gives the enemy in-
formation that he can turn to ad-
vantage. There have been unfortun-
ate experiences of that sort.

It should be clearly understood that
whatever may be done about the pub-
lished lists, there is no intention of
withholding information from the im-
mediate relatives and friends of men
who are killed, wounded or captured.
The family or "next friend" will in
every case be notified immediately.

Get a little real taste of war by
conserving food "till it hurts." Go-
ing without dessert for a week at a
time, or eating a slice or two less of
bread a day, may hurt a little but re-
member it's a life or a limb the boys
at the front are risking. Painless pa-
triotism won't help much. Cut down
on wheat and sweets until it hurts.

SHIPPING ENTERPRISE

There is inspiration in a shipbuild-
ing story that comes from New York.
It concerns a new shipyard estab-
lished at Port Newark, which has gone
about its business in a totally unprece-
dented but thoroughly American way.

The usual process in creating a ship
plant is first to build the ways and
the shops, and then to start building
ships. The Submarine Boat Corpora-
tion at Port Newark reversed this pro-
cess. It started right off laying keels
and when it had the ships started, it
began building the ways and the
shops.

"Right now at Port Newark," says
the New York Times, "you may see
men riveting up bottom plates, and
frames and laying floor plates of 5-
000-ton ships, while alongside other
men are working on the very ways on
which those ships rest, with pile driv-
ers driving in the way footings, and
locomotive cranes handling the mate-
rial, while other gangs of men are
erecting the big tower derricks which
will replace the locomotives later on.
And back in the yard shops men are
working at the rolls and furnaces and
bending floors, while others are fin-
ishing the roof over their heads."

They have 13 keels already afloat, and
four ships well on the road to com-
pletion, when by the ordinary proce-
dure they would not yet have a single
ship started.

With such spirit and enterprise, the
U-boats will certainly be beaten.

Mr. Hoover has asked for team-
work. If you are riding a hobby
horse, climb down off it until the war
is over. All your energies are needed
in the big fight against Prussianism.
All other crusades can wait. Don't
give aid and comfort to the enemy by
stirring up strife, even in a good
cause, when you should be back of
your government heart and soul, in-
stead of embarrassing it with internal
turmoil. Let's all give Mr. Hoover the
teamwork he wants. Remember we
are fighting a nation whose teamwork
is perfect—and compulsory.

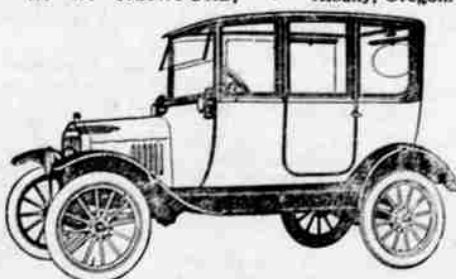

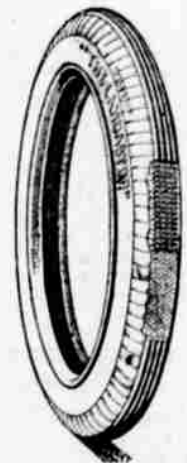
