SPORES, ALLEGED SLACKER RUN OUT OF PORTLAND

A well-directed kick from the toe of Deputy District Attorney Ryan's boot and an injunction to "keep on going" was the reception accorded to Jake Spores, alleged slacker and pro-German, late of Eugene when he made his appearance in Portland late Saturday afternoon.

Spores, who was escorted out of Lane county last Wednesday by a committee of 60 vigilantes, appeared at police headquarters late Saturday afternoon and inquired for the district attorney. "I want to swear out a warrant for those Eugene people who ran me out of town," Spores explained to Deputy Attorney Ryan.

He produced a clipping from the Oregonian of last Thursday, in which an account was given of his forcible ejection from Eugene by a committee of a half hundred determined citizens. "Are you the man named in this article?" queried Ryan.

"Yes, and I want to have them arrested," replied Spores.

But he had hardly made his explanation when Ryan jumped to his feet, grabbed Spores by the collar and shoved him to the stairway nearby. Ryan's right foot shot out to assist Spores in his hurried trip down the stairway.

When last seen, Spores was heading for the Union depot with Patrolman Lillis close by in the offing to see that he heeded Ryan's command to keep on going.

According to a report from Eugene, Spores was compelled to leave there because of his unpatriotic sentiments which he indiscreetly expressed publicly. Eugene citizens say that he has made seditious remarks, has refused to subscribe to any of the war funds and has belittled the liberty bond campaigns.

He was ejected from Eugene because, it was said, he was the worst of a number of unpatriotic people living in Lane county. He narrowly escaped being tarred and feathered, the committee of citizens having eliminated this feature from his farewell reception upon his promise never to return.

Spores came to Albany from Eugene and tried to secure legal assistance from local attorneys, but was refused in every case.

TEETH OF ANTEDILUVIAN BEAST FOUND AT LEBANON

Remains Found in Spring Indicate Willamette Valley Was Haunt of Extinct Monster

Three teeth of the extinct mammoth—hoary forebear of the quaternary elephant—were found recently in a spring on the farm of J. J. Swan, near Lebanon. Mr. Swan was cleaning and enlarging the spring so as to secure his water supply therefrom, and the heavy grinders, together with a piece of jawbone, were found in the mud deposit.

The teeth are very large and heavy. They are in a perfect state of preservation and are among the best specimens ever found here. The outside enamel, pulp and roots are as white and hard as when their prehistoric owner bore them in his massive jaw. Indians, unable to understand the
