MISFITS

Just before I left Portland on a trip
to this sound city on the Sound I met
Mrs. J. K. Weatherford, Mrs. W. L.
Marks, her mother Mrs. Geo. Dinding-
er and Mrs. Dr. Tracy on their way
to an Oregon Electric train to return
to Albany, and promised to put their
names in the Misfit column, which
has never been honored by the names
of any finer lot of women.

I was over at St. Johns just before
coming here and, while there during a
short stay, met three former Albany
men, S. N. Braden and Mr. Franzer,
on night shifts at the shipyard, and
W. E. Kelly, doing housebuilding.

At the time I met the D. A. R. wo-
men I also met John Bergman, banker,
of Florence, just starting for home.
This suggests a reminiscence. John-
ny is one of the boys who quite a
number of years ago helped put Al-
bany college on the map athletically.
The college's track team, under Bill
Haywood, defeated the U. O. team.
Bergman carrying off the honors in
the sprints, Alton Coates in hurdles
and Bob Torbet in the short sprints,
with a remarkable record for the 50
yards.

Now for Seattle. This is some live
town, with a harbor that gives it a
great prestige and presages a re-
markable growth in the future. Ev-
erything, though, seems to be a com-
parison with Portland, with Portland
as the under dog. But Portland is
good enough for me, by fellow-coun-
trymen. It is a cleaner city morally
and is more pushing commercially
than many wish to admit. The figures
speak for themselves. If Seattle was
out of the game Portland at this min-
ute would be looked upon as a very
snappy city. It is, and one should be
broad enough to judge such things on
their individual merits without so
much comparison.

Was just leaving a cafeteria last
evening when a man came up to my
daughter and me and said: "Aren't
you Mr. N. and daughter?" "We cer-
tainly are." It was Earl Younger,
who has been with the Scandinavian
bank here for 12 years. He was an
Albany man for a number of years,
his father being an employee of the old
woolen mill there, now labor commis-
sioner at Washington. He left Albany
Oregon when a boy of 15, 17 years
ago, and it was pretty good for him
to remember us when not expecting to
see us, after so many years.

Another former Albany boy whom I
met today, also a banker, is Chester
Porter. He has a fine home, with
three children, including twins.

Miss Eva Simpson, a former Albany
girl, is a Seattle teacher and boards
at the Lincoln, a fine place. Like
David Copperfield, I have been on all
sides of the building but haven't seen
her yet. My headquarters in the P.
O. building are not far from the Lin-
coln.

Wasn't that an Albany boy, my daugh-
ter said last evening as we passed
a fine-looking member of the navy in
peut uniform. It was Kenneth Mc-
Lennan, and we had a short visit. He
has been here for several months.

An announcement of a basketball
game tonight between an all-star
team and the Y. M. C. A. gives the
name of Lyle Bigbee as one of the all-
stars.

Haven't secured a list of former
Albany people here yet, but will try
and send one later. Perhaps the long-
est here are Roy Ballard and George
Furry, of the Seattle Hardware Co.,
one of the richest concerns here. They
came from Albany in about 1882.

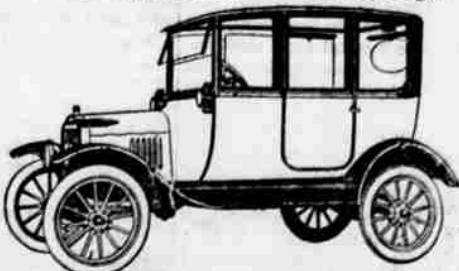

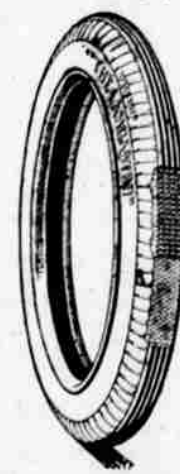
