LIBERTY DAY

The sixth of April, a day destined to be famous forever in our annals, has somehow taken to itself a wonderfully appropriate name.

Our Fourth of July, as everybody knows, is Independence Day. This new festival, established in honor of our entrance into the war for the liberation of the world from military oppression, is "Liberty Day." Thus we have another Fourth, so to speak, with a spirit much like that of our great and venerable holiday and with a title reminiscent of it, and yet with a new character of its own.

Liberty Day is naturally associated with the Liberty Loan. The third great loan to finance Liberty's war is to begin on that day. The most appropriate form of celebration is a subscription for Liberty Bonds. That is expected as a matter of course from every loyal citizen who is above the stark poverty line.

But the celebration should not stop there. In every community in America the day should be observed with special public programs. And in every home parents should impress upon their children the deep significance of the occasion.

We may all take pride, for the rest of our lives, in the recollection that on April 6, 1918, we celebrated the first Liberty Day in a way that set the example for following generations.

General March is now at the head of the army. That's the stuff—forward, March!

SEEK OTHER WORK

What's your job? If it's not of any particular value in helping the nation win the war, or if it's one that has been curtailed by any war policy of the government, there's something you can do about it right now. That is, change it.

Many private building operations are going to be curtailed. But the men ordinarily employed in them need not worry about lack of work. There's so much to be done in similar lines, for the government now instead of for individuals that there's a chance for everybody to work who will.

Secretary McAdoo, in a letter to Samuel Gompers, puts it up to labor as an opportunity for patriotic action.

Mr. McAdoo said, "Men are needed to build ships, to build houses, to erect plants to produce war material, to run our railroads, to operate our industries and to procure food required by the allies and ourselves. These needs are already great, and will increase, not lessen, as the war progresses."

And there's always gardening or farm work for those in danger of suffering enforced idleness through the effect of war on their usual occupations.

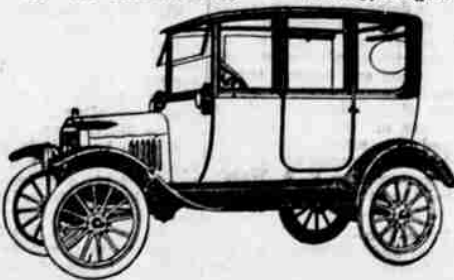
