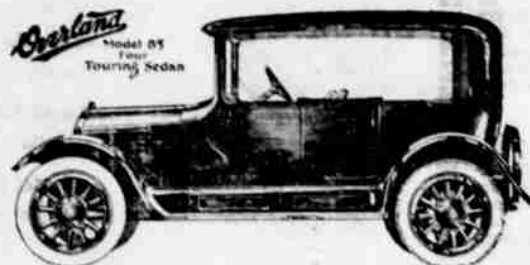
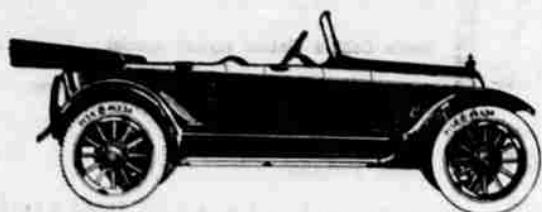

Bell Telephone Volunteers

More than 7,000 employees of the Bell System are now enrolled or in actual military service, including 14 battalions of Signal Corps reserves. Many Bell employees are members of the Federalized National Guard or of the Naval Coast Defense Reserve. Over ten per cent of the male employees of the company are now or soon will be engaged in active military service. A large proportion of these Bell System volunteers are telephone engineers and technically trained men. They leave gaps in the Bell ranks not easily filled.
