Winter Wheat Crop

Is Almost Normal

WASHINGTON, April 8.—(U. P.)
—According to an announcement by
the department of agriculture, the
condition of the winter wheat crop in
the United States April 1st was 78.4
normal as against 83.4 on April 1,
1917. This is approximately five per
cent less than the average for the past
ten years.

This report forecasts a production
of 560,000,000 bushels of winter
wheat as against 618,000,000 for
last year.

British Help Japs

Guard Vladivostok

WASHINGTON, April 8.—(U. P.)
—Official confirmation of the landing
of British troops with the Japanese at
Vladivostok has been received by the
state department. The troops were
landed to preserve order.

United States will continue the "hands
off" policy, and that there is appar-
ently no reason why this country
should enter a protest.

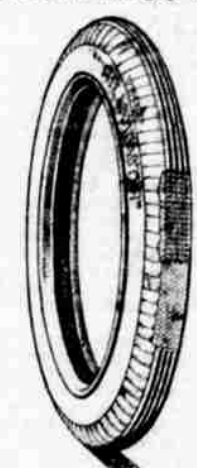
