ELECTRICAL RIFLE IS INVENTED IN OREGON —GOVERNMENT TRIES IT

MARSHFIELD, April 9.—(U. P.)—J. B. Peters, with Mrs. Peters, was planning today to leave for Annapolis where he will superintend a test to be made by the government of his electrical invention—a deadly war machine of the rifle type.

The device, which Peters invented six months ago, proved so promising that the government commandeered it without waiting for a patent. It is said to be something entirely new. It can be used as an auxiliary for either rifles or heavy field artillery.

Desiring to keep his plans off paper and yet wishing to safeguard their preservation, Peters has taught the secret to Mrs. Peters. The tests at Annapolis will be extensive and conclusive.

consistent with an economical and wise administration of public affairs. I am, therefore, in favor of the same principle in the administration of the business of the county.

"I believe in that reasonable progress and development along all the lines of county management which is clearly consistent with a due regard for the general welfare of the whole people of the county, keeping in view all the time the just interests of those who have to pay the taxes."

"I shall not at any time favor unreasonable taxes for any purpose of any kind whatever."

"I am also in favor of good roads so far as may be necessary and consistent with a wise, sound and just economy to those who have to pay for them."

"The Oregon legislature has doubtless, of late years, imposed many burdensome and unreasonable taxes upon the people of the state, but that evil practice can only be remedied by the legislature itself."

"If I am nominated and elected I shall use my best efforts to enforce all the laws which it will be my duty to carry into effect, and to see that every dollar paid out by the county brings in its full value for a proper purpose, and that every dollar's worth of every kind of property pays its just proportion of the taxes."

"I favor maintaining a strict vigilance over the administration of estates of deceased persons and the guardianship of minors, and also favor reasonable and necessary assistance to destitute orphan children."

"In these critical times of great peril to our common country, and the whole world, it is necessary that we all practice a wise and reasonable economy, and give all the aid we can to the support of that brave and patriotic army of our best young men who have gone, are still going, and will continue to go, until the dreadful war is over, to sacrifice their lives for us and human liberty in the trenches of death on the fearful battlefields of Europe."

"There never has been a time in the history of man when there was more at stake than there is in the present struggle. In the language of the great Lincoln the question is: 'Shall government of the people, by the people and for the people perish from the earth?' And shall mankind be again enslaved and trampled for ages in the dust under the iron heel of autocratic and arbitrary power? We all with great determination say, not until after the sacred fire of human liberty has burned out on all the altars of freedom."
