State Employees

Ask Wage Boosts

SALEM, April 11.—(U. P.)—Superintendents of many state institutions today presented to the state board of control at a special meeting here schedules of wage increases for state employees.

At a meeting April 3 the board allowed wage increases approximating \$27,000 annually to employees of the Oregon State hospital and the Soldiers' Home at Roseburg. Increases for the other employees probably will be given today. At the hospital increases of \$10 a month were granted to employees receiving less than \$60 monthly. Increases approximating \$1,500 additional yearly were allowed at the Soldiers' Home.
