

NORTHWEST WILL CONSERVE UNDER MILL INSPECTOR

The federal food administration for Oregon and Linn county would announce at this time that a mill inspector has been appointed for the states of Oregon, Idaho and Washington. The purpose of this appointment is to insure the utmost conservation of wheat, and to provide for an equitable distribution of flour and feeds, and to stabilize the prices of mill products at as low a figure as is possible under war conditions.

It is estimated that the next few months, between now and next harvest, are likely to be the most critical of the war as far as foods are concerned in the countries of our allies. It is said that the bread rations of the civilian population in France has been reduced to barely one-third of the average daily bread consumption of the French peasant before the war.
