### CANDIDATE FOR JOINT SENATOR IN ALBANY

#### John Bell of Eugene Gives Statement of Position on Legislative Matters

John B. Bell, a prominent resident of Eugene, vice-president of the Bank of Shedd and candidate for joint senator from Linn and Lane counties, arrived in Albany this morning and spent the greater portion of the day in meeting local members of his party in this section of the senatorial district.

Declaring that he has no personal interests to serve and taking a shot at the methods of the state legislature and incidentally at his opponent, Elbert Bede of Cottage Grove, Mr. Bell gave out a statement defining his position. The statement reads as follows:

"During my residence in Oregon, covering a period of 11 years, I have watched with interest the frantic promise of the various candidates for the legislature every two years. From my place in the business world it has become a fixed conviction with me, that these many promises and assertions have resulted in many things being written into our statutes that are absolutely useless; that our revenue laws in particular have been tampered with at every session in a more or less childish fashion, until now it is difficult for even our most efficient officers to determine just what the law is. In view of these facts and believing that my friends can rely upon me to use my whole energy for the benefit of Linn and Lane counties as the occasion may arise, I am making a few promises.

"My opponent has raised the question of the unreasonable charge for publishing the delinquent tax list, evidently anticipating that this same matter would be raised in my behalf. Everybody knows, of course, that the charges now are exorbitant and they should be lowered; but, on the other hand, it is a matter of common knowledge, especially in the newspaper world and among others familiar with the doings of the legislature, that my opponent spent practically all of his time during the last session of the legislature at Salem as a paid lobbyist in the interest of these bills that he now says are wrong.

"As a general rule I refrain from attacking in the least measure any line of business, particularly the newspapers. They represent something in our strenuous times. They are doing more than any other kind of business to help win the war, in which we are all so much interested. There are many things to be said in favor of publishing the delinquent tax list, and it is only fair that the newspapers should be paid for it at a reasonable rate.

"It is a matter of small moment to me whether I am nominated and elected or not. It is, however, of more importance that my opponent should and ought to be defeated. As an instance of his undependability as a legislator, let me cite you to this: that he brought suit against Lane county two years ago to compel the county to pay his own and a Eugene paper hundreds of dollars for publishing the proceedings of the county court, in addition to that required to be published by law. The judge of the circuit court held, however, that the publication of the matter sued for was absolutely unnecessary and unreasonable and his action failed.

I cannot say that I have had legislative experience, even as a lobbyist. My business judgment and my standing in the communities in which I have lived must be my only recommendation in coming before you and asking for your votes. If you want a senator who will work for first class businesslike legislation and who has no personal motives to promote, I want your support—I am that kind of a candidate."
