Effect of Loans on Bank Deposits

J. K. Lynch, governor of the federal reserve bank, gave out in San Francisco today the official figures of the controller of currency showing that the total deposits of national banks which on March 5, 1917, aggregated \$12,957,000,000, had increased on March 4, 1918, to the extent of \$1,480,589,000 in spite of the sale in the interim of \$5,808,000,000 Liberty

Bonds of the first and second issues.

These figures, according to governor Lynch, show how unfounded were the fears of some banks during the first and second Liberty Loan drives that the intensive canvass being made for subscriptions would have a disastrous effect on their deposits. The total amount of Liberty Bonds owned by the national banks of the United States on March 4, 1918, was \$433,738,000, indicating that the distribution of the Liberty Loan bonds among in-

dividuals in accordance with sound fiscal policy has been so successful that only about seven per cent of the first and second loans were left in the hands of the national banks.
